#### **Host Club Information**

Carlyle Sailing Association began in 1971 as a not-for-profit club geared towards one-design sailing and racing. To date CSA has held championships for Lightning, Y-Flyer, Flying Scot, E-Scow, San Juan, Mutineer, Enterprise, Hobie 20; plus 2 US SAILING Championship of Champion Regattas and Yachting's One-of-a-Kind Regatta.

Built entirely by its volunteer membership, CSA has over the years expanded to build their Harbormaster's house, Observation Building (Clubhouse) and Pavilion.

Over the past decades, CSA has committed itself to building a great Junior program. This growth has amassed Optis, Lasers and Snipes, as well as a week long Junior camp in June.

On the adult side, CSA holds camps with US SAILING certified instructors for over 40 sailors each summer on San Juans, Flying Scots and multihulls.

Our mission at CSA is to continue to offer a great sailing & racing experience and grow the club through the great volunteer spirit that has brought us to where we are today.

#### **Local Conditions**

The Midwest in October offers fantastic sailing conditions. The foliage around the lake will be in full fall color bloom.

- The winds should average 7-12 knots out of the North to Southwest.
- The day temperatures should be in the 70's with lows in the evenings in the 50's.
- Carlyle Lake's sailing area is roughly 5 x 2 miles, so the water will be mostly flat, unless there's an overnight blow out of the North to Northwest.
- There are no shallow worries except within 30-40 feet of shoreline.
- The water will still be on the warmer side, in the 70's.

# History

# A History of the US SAILING Championships

US SAILING's Championships offer a wide variety of disciplines including invitational, ladder, resume, and open events in which sailors of all ages can test their skills at a national level. Over the years, US SAILING Championships have helped shape the sport of sailboat racing. In 1925, the North American Yacht Racing Union, which later dissolved and spurred US SAILING, was primarily an administrative body concerned with developing uniform racing rules and boat rating systems. It was not until the founding of the Championships did the organization begin to reach sailors both along America's coasts and inland. Soon after women won the right to vote in this country, what is believed to be "the first women's championship ever held in the world" surely the first in North America was contested.

The Championships have served an important role in unifying sailing instructions, developing types of race courses, helping shape racing rules for certain aspects of the sport, initiating such features as moving the windward mark in case of a wind shift, drawing top local competitors to national and even worldwide competition and helping identify and prepare America's top sailors for the Olympics. The Championships, trophies and winners provide a glimpse into the glorious history of the sport, and provide a canvas for the young sailors of today to paint their own version of tomorrow's history.

Some of the championships are by resume application only. One particular event, US SAILING's Championship of Champions for the Jack Brown Trophy, is a combination invitation/elimination entry process. Winners of national, North American or world championships of 20 selected one design classes compete the following year to see who is the best of the best.

Identifying champions, selecting sailors for international competition and developing sailors for the U.S. Olympic Team are only part of the purpose of US SAILING Championships. As every sailor knows, just racing with top notch competitors who are willing to share their expertise, makes for better racing for all of us.

**Skipper: Paul Cayard** Crew: **Austin Sperry Kristine Wake** Class: **Special Guest** 

Paul Cayard was the first American skipper to win the Whitbread Round the World Race in 1998 on EF Language. In 2005-06, Paul skippered the Disney entry, Pirates of the Caribbean in the Volvo Ocean Race, winning the final leg into Gothenburg (Sweden) and placing a commanding second overall.

Paul is a seven-time sailing world champion, a five-time America's Cup veteran and two-time Olympian. The Star World Championship in 1988 is Paul's most treasured prize. Cavard's

accolades include election to the Sailing World Hall of Fame in 2002 and Rolex Yachtsman of the Year in 1998.

Austin Sperry began sailing at a young age on San Francisco Bay. He



started out in El Toros and 5.5 metres, but before long was sailing with his father in Star boats. It was then that Austin's passion and talent for sailing began to emerge. After graduation from Whittier College in Los Angeles Austin returned to San Francisco to focus on his sailing, while working as an institutional equities trader at Banc of America Securities. Austin sailed with three accomplished skippers in his campaign leading up to the 2004 Olympic Team Trials: He started crewing for George Szabo, moved on to sail with John Kostecki, and sailed the final year leading up to the trials with Andy MacDonald.

Austin And Andy did not qualify for the Olympics that year, but Paul Cavard, the trials winner, selected Austin to sail the sparring partner boat with Andy Lovell. His training taught Austin incomparable lessons about Olympic sailing and prepared him for his future in the Star. When he is not sailing, Austin hails from St. Francis YC and Pass Christian YC, and lives in Gulfport (MS) with his wife Sally.

Kristine Wake began cruising the Great Lakes with her family at age 4, and became part of the crew during PHRF racing in the 4th grade. Ric Larsen took Kristine to her first Lightning Regatta when she was 13 and she's been hooked ever since. In college she competed for the UW Madison Sailing Team, and served as captain. She qualified for ICYRA Women's Nationals for 3 years. After college she took a break from

sailing for medical school and residency, then she and her husband returned to the Lightning in 2000. Since then they've attended the majority of the North American Championships and the last two World Championships with their best finish being 5th in the NA's and 9th in the Worlds. She had the opportunity last year to also sail in the Melges 24 Nationals and two of the four regattas in the Etchells Jaquar Series with Allan and Katie Terhune where they won the Sid Doren Regatta this past January. Kristine lives in Sheboygan, Wisconsin with my husband and two sons and works as a pediatrician. She also serves on the board of directors of the new US Sailing Center-Sheboygan.

Mike is a two-time 5O5 World Champion and two-time 18 Foot Skiff World Champion.

Known for his ability to tame big breeze, and the lethal combination of sailing smarts and speed, Mike made history in the 505 class as the first person in the



history of the class to win a world championship as both a skipper and crew.

He is an accomplished design and mechanical engineer of repute - his full time job – and known as a top sailing engineer, knowing how to make boats faster and work more efficiently. His boat of choice - the 505 - a very technical, speed-oriented machine that requires you to be both fast and fast thinking to win.

is a US SAILING Level 1 Instructor teaching Juniors on Opti's, Lasers and 420's. Active with Lasers, Ultimate 20's, Viper 640 and the Buccaneer, being out on the water attempting to sail the fastest tactical course within the different fleet's is the utmost fun.

Jim Daus is from Boulder. CO. He is now sailing primarily on Buccaneer 18's. Jim was captain of the sailing team (420's) while attending Vassar College. He was the 2007 Buccaneer North American Champion and





David Rumbaugh: I started sailing Hobie 16's when I was 9 years. In my late teens I moved into dinghy sailing and loved the technical aspect of close quarters racing and have never looked back. I started sailing Coronado 15's in 2003 as a crew and bought my first boat a year later at the end of 2004. I have been racing C15's ever since and along with my crew Anne Newton we have won the past three North American Championships (in Long Beach–2007, Half Moon Bay–2008, and Huntington Lake–2009). I have been fortunate to have raced many different boats over the past 10 years in and around San Francisco Bay. I participated in the 2003

Melges 24 Nationals in Santa Cruz, and the 2005 Etchells Worlds on San Francisco Bay, as well as the last two Santana 20 Nationals with Anne and Steve. The three of us also sail a Thistle together and we were able to take 3rd at the NorCal Districts this year. Most recently the crew and I were able to take 3rd at the Pacific Coast Championships for the Lightning fleet out of Richmond Yacht Club which was our first introduc-

tion to this boat.

Steve Fishman/ Bow Crew: Μv primary racing experience is racing C-15's since about 2005. normally racing with my 18 & 21 year old kids. The C-15 is a good inexpensive boat for the Sacramento Valley that will generally draw 15-20 boats for a regatta.

Ted qualified for the C of C by winning the 2009 Day Sailor North Americans which were sailed in July at Stage Harbor Yacht Club, Cape Cod, Massachusetts. Ted grew up sailing Beetle Cats and Day Sailors at Chatham Yacht Club in Chatham, MA. He captained his high school sail-

ing team at Belmont Hill School and his college team at Princeton University where he met his best friend and long-time crew, Jonathan Foot (who followed Ted as captain at Princeton).

Ted and Jonathan started campaigning Day Sailors in 1983, winning the DSNACs in 1983, 1985, and 1990 (and finishing second in a borrowed boat in 1984). Jonathan grew up racing Day Sailors in Bucks Harbor, Maine and has a distinguished and varied racing career including crewing on a boat that won the Chicago-Mackinac race and sailing the Finn Midwinters. Jonathan also has won the DSNACs crewing for his wife, Barbara. Ted previously sailed the C of C in 1990 with his wife, Melissa. Ted and Melissa also race Beetle Cats together, winning the men's division of the Beetle Cat nationals this past August. Jonathan has sailed the C of C twice previously, once with his wife and once with his wife and her father, Dan Duggan. Ted and Jonathan are both actively involved in promoting racing and junior sailing. Ted just completed his tenure as Commodore of Chatham Yacht Club, and Jonathan runs the junior sailing program at Bucks Harbor Yacht Club.

The third member of their crew is Ted's fourteen-year-old daughter, Emily. Emily has raced Optimists, Beetle Cats, and 420s and is looking forward to sailing Lightning's for the first time.

She qualified for the blue fleet in her first Lightning North American Championships in 2006, and finished 14th at Lightning World Championships in 2009. She is currently studying political science at Middlebury College, and has competed with Middlebury's sailing team.

Born and raised in Portland Oregon, Allison Webber has been sailing at Vancouver lake sailing club since 1992 when she started sailing with her dad in their lightning 'Brain Donkey' at weekly races and local regattas. When she got a little older they would drive down to the California Circuit where she was awarded the highest placing female sailor twice. She have been to Lightning NA's 5 times the last 4 crewing for Darrell Peck and one Worlds.

Paul bought his first sailboat, a \$100 Styrofoam board boat, from Speigel's catalog in 1968 and then his first real sailboat, a used C Scow, from Buddy Melges in 1969. He bought his first Y-Flyer in 1973 and has

Paul and his wife Kay joined the Indianapolis Sailing Club, ISC, in 1971 and have been very active in the Club and in the ISC Y-Flyer Fleet. In 2008, this competition was held at Sudbury Ontario, Canada. Paul and Kay won that regatta and he represents the Y-Flyer Class in this 2009 C of C Regatta.

Paul is also very active in race management. He is certified by US SAILING as a Club Race Officer and was PRO of the 2009 Y-Flyer National Regatta.

Steve Roeschlein is the youngest of 7 in a family of sailors. Steve's Dad started sailing in the Y-Class by building his own wooden Y in a building

She has been crewing for Steve ever since until their daughters came of age and wanted to learn to sail.

With the price of sailing going up like everything else in this sport, about 15 years ago Steve started making sails since he could not afford to buy new ones every two years to remain competitive. So, with a little help from his family and fellow sailors he started making sails in his basement - with an understanding wife. Two years ago his older brother Howard and his wife won the Y-Flyer Nationals at Carlyle Lake using sails that he made, making him a National Champion sail maker.

Steve now enjoys sailing with his daughters Michelle (age 15) and Megan (even more than he did when he was their age), and competing with his extended family the - Y-Flyer Class.



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
