





Bill began sailing Lightnings by crewing for his dad in the early 70s. Bill bought his first boat in 1987.


Since then he's been active on the regatta circuit and sailing on his home waters of Lake Champlain in VT.



The ILCA Fund

The International Lightning Class Association has been granted status as a 501(c)3 charity by the Internal Revenue Service. Just like gifts to the United Fund and the Olympic Committee, gifts to the I.L.C.A. can be deducted from income in computing your taxes. You can make a gift and the I.L.C.A., of course, gets the full value of your gift to use for many worthy projects. A donor may specify a particular use for the donation or allow it to go to the general operating budget. Stock may also be transferred to the I.L.C.A. with added tax advantages.

The I.L.C.A. Fund was formed in 1982 to give some direction and impetus to the solicitation of charitable gifts. The I.L.C.A. Fund is directed by a committee of five I.L.C.A. members who serve staggered three year terms. Each year members send gifts along with their I.L.C.A. dues. Several large gifts have been received, including a 30 acre farm in Mississippi and the funds to purchase the beautiful Masters' Trophy awarded each year at the St. Petersburg Regatta. Income from the I.L.C.A. farm is earmarked for use in promotion of Lightning sailing. Other uses of the fund change each year as the requirements of the Class and office vary.

The long term objective of the Fund is to build an endowment equal to two hundred percent of the I.L.C.A.'s annual budget. This should help guarantee that the Class will remain solvent and to ensure future sailors the opportunity to enjoy the excitement and fellowship of sailing Lightning Class sailboats.

Most sailors who have been members of the I.L.C.A. for several years come to realize that the value they receive from participation in the sport of racing and sailing Lightning Class yachts is much greater than the \$45.00 annual dues. Gifts to the Fund provide a means, with help of the tax deduction, to pay the I.L.C.A. back.

When you pay your membership dues, include something extra as a gift to the Fund.



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Savannah Deep South 2000

Typical Savannah. What a great way to open the season. 35 boats made it here this year. I can't understand why more folks don't make it to this regatta. It is definitely one of my favorites. The Savannah Yacht Club should give lessons on how to put on regattas. John McIntosh Jr. runs impeccable races in the most challenging conditions. The Savannah Yacht Club puts on a great dinner, t-shirts, lunches for both days, and coffee and donuts all for \$110.

Wind was out of the south to SSW Saturday. The tide was going out all day, so the current was pushing us upwind. Race one started after two general recalls with Jack Elfman leading the way at the first weather mark. We got flushed off the line and got to the weather mark in about 20th. The pack was all pretty tight as we headed to the reeds to get out of the current. We managed to weave and bob our way down the leg and passed a big group of boats before the left hand turn up the Skidaway River. Larry MacDonald got by Jack, and pulled away from the pack. We managed to continue to pick off a few boats each leg, and had a good duel for second with Steve Hayden on the last two legs. Steve ended up ahead of us after we both closed the gap on Larry's big lead. Greg Fisher had a comeback similar to our own and ended up 4th.

Race two started immediately afterwards with Bill Faude leading at the first mark. The breeze was up a little for the start and looked like it might be building for the race, but turned out to be just as shifty and puffy as usual. We rounded the top mark in about 15th and stayed there most of the race. Larry MacDonald and Jeff Linton eventually ground down Bill Faude. Brian Hayes and Tom Starck made big comeback moves on the second downwind leg to jump up into the lead pack.

Weather forecast was for a large front to come through late in the afternoon, and fortunately it held off until the last boats were getting pulled out of the water. Unfortunately, it also kept us off the water on Sunday and the regatta concluded with just the two races sailed.

Miami Midwinter Regatta 2000

Day One: Wow what a great day of sailing! Wind out of the ENE 15-20. 44 boats. Three great races.

Race 1 - We had a decent start in the middle of the line, and we seemed to have some good speed. The racing was really tight near the top of the fleet with Jeff Linton leading at the weather mark, followed by Larry MacDonald and Andy Horton. We rounded about 6th with a tight pack that included Greg Fisher, Steve Hayden, Hector Longarela, and Jack Elfman. A few good sized puffs rolled in and Jeff Linton was the first victim of the day with a nice deathroll on the first run. It is no fun tipping over, but even less fun when you are leading the race! We had some good gains on the run and rounded the leeward mark about 4th right on the heels of Andy and Greg. On the second beat we managed to get by those guys and rounded second behind Larry, who had built up a nice lead. Downwind the positions didn't change much and we closed a little on Larry, but the positions behind us changed a little on the last beat: MacDonald first, us 2nd, Longarela 3rd, Horton 4th, and Fisher 5th.

Race 2 - Bill Faude sailed a nice beat and beat us to the weather mark by about 2 boatlengths. He extended a little on the run as we didn't have clear air for a little while. On the second beat Bill and us stretched it out a little with Greg Fisher, Eamonn deLisser, and Larry MacDonald duking it out for third. We were feeling pretty good because we had phenomenal speed both upwind and downwind with a nice cushion between us and the next pack. Then disaster! The backstay line came untied under the back deck, and the backstay was totally useless! Eamonn, Greg, and Larry were able to grind us down pretty quickly as we couldn't do much to flatten the main and depower. We were doing a pretty good job hanging in there until about 2/3 the way up the beat when the jib tack pin broke and the wire and cloth came off the jib at the tack. If you think it is painful sailing upwind with your backstay flogging around in the air behind your boat - add no jib to the equation! After what seemed like hours, Tim was able to tie the jib tack grommet down to the bow eye, and we were able to limp into the finish at 13th. As soon as the race was over, we dropped the main and jib and were able to make some repairs to get ready for race three. This is extremely painful for me as I rig my own boats, and this one was brand new - no one to blame but myself! Definitely the longest and most painful leg I've ever sailed. Jeff Linton broke a main halyard and had to drop out after he was among the early leaders in this race.

Race 3 - We watched a lot of this one from the cheap seats and spent most of the race trying to catch up. We felt pretty good about catching up to 12th. Tom Allen Jr. lead this one wire to wire, and Jack Elfman was second all the way around as well. This was just a perfect day of sailing.

Day 2: Warm, sunny, breezy. Wind was about 20 degrees further right than yesterday (east) and more sunny, but not quite as windy. It was still full on hiking all day. Way better than shoveling snow!

Race one. We had a clean start in the middle of the line. The breeze was shifting back and forth about 10 degrees so staying in phase was key. At the first mark Bill Mauk led the way with Dave Peck hot on his heels. We rounded about 5th or 6th but the fleet was very tightly packed. Positions were constantly changing during the race with big gains and losses to be made. On the last beat we didn't pay attention and positioned ourselves poorly out of the breeze to lose 4 boats on the final beat to finish eighth. Dave Peck got by Bill Mauk on the second beat and won by a large margin. Larry MacDonald ended up third. This racing was really tight. Brian Hayes sailed a nice last beat to finish 4th.

Race two saw much the same conditions as race one, but with a little more breeze, maybe 18 or so, but puffy and shifty. We had the unfortunate luck of starting just to windward of Jeff Linton who was able to work out on us after about three minutes of sailing. We were able to hang in there until we could tack out on a shift. Jeff was obviously going well as he got to the windward mark in first. Again the racing was very close and a large pack got to the windward mark very close to the same time. Andy Horton was second and Larry, Steve Hayden and our boat were in that

group. At the leeward gate Jeff, Larry and we went to the right mark and Andy and Steve lead another pack around the left mark. There was a little more wind on the left so we gained. Jeff held the lead but Larry picked off Andy and the four of us extended quite a bit on the rest of the fleet on this leg. Up the last beat, Steve Hayden, Bill Faude, and Dave Peck all closed the gap a little, with Larry and Andy getting by Jeff.

Today was Larry MacDonald's 41st birthday and winning the last race and the Miami regatta was a good birthday treat for him. Larry again sailed with his all-star crew of Jody Swanson and Skip Dieball, and they have a real stranglehold on the overall circuit points at the moment. So far they have 14 points in 7 races. Apparently Skip is holding them back a little because Larry and Jody are kicking him off the boat in favor of Ian Jones for St. Pete.

Overall Larry's team won Miami with a large margin of victory. Andy Horton suffered a DSQ in the first race today that dropped him out of second place. There were only 4 points between 2nd and 7th. Our big 11 point drop in the second race yesterday really hurt us in the standings, but we still are pleased that we sailed well.





Remembrances of the 2000 Southern Circuit

The Southern Circuit of 2000 was a new and great experience for our family. I rejoined the Lightning class in 1998 after a short sabbatical of almost 40 years (yup, that's correct, the last major Lightning regatta I sailed was the 1961 Worlds in Milford, CT as a crew for Bob Crane). I brought my wife Susie and our oldest daughter Kimberly, and the SC was the most fun we have had sailing since we left the Jet 14 class and moved to Maryland in 1985.

We want to tell you of our experiences and convince you to come to the Southern Circuit in future years. Forget all the stories you may have heard about the gnats in Savannah, the long drive to Miami, strong winds and every other possible reason you have used to avoid some to the best sailing available for Lightnings.

This is the time to enjoy some of the best sailing the Lightning class has to offer, the facilities of some of the finest yacht clubs (Coral Reef of Miami is the oldest yacht club in the US), not to mention the opportunity to meet friendly interesting people (one person had recently started a non-profit organization to improve the education system in his state, another had raised money to build a library for his town, and another was recipient of five national championships in unrelated sports, just to name a few). Did we need some help? All we had to do was ask. Did we have fun? Just ask my family.

In preparation for the trip, we purchased new trailer tires and had the trailer hubs pulled and serviced (one set of bearings was so bad that the mechanic said we would have been lucky to make it to Virginia). We also had the tow vehicle serviced and found a bad fan belt and brakes that were in need of replacement. It was money well spent. We had no troubles on the trip, but I heard at least two stories of problems with trailer bearings.

We arrived in Savannah early afternoon on Friday. We had been

warned about the "noseeums', thought we were prepared for them with "Skin So Soft," but if they think you taste good, they bite. The solution: launch the boat and go for a 2-hour sail in 70degree weather with winds enough to sit on the rail, but also gentle enough to practice tack, jibe, spinnaker up, spinnaker down for a crew who was a little rusty from winter inactivity. We sailed up every river

we could find to locate the racecourse, only to find out in the Skipper's Meeting the next day that we had gone too far. It was right in front of the Savannah YC.

As part of the entry fee, SYC provided continental breakfasts and box lunches each day with a buffet dinner on Saturday night. At the Skipper's Meeting we asked more questions of the PRO than he would have liked as we tried to understand the courses. After the meeting, several of the class members who had done the SC before made a point to stop by and insure we understood. What a great feeling, but we still did not understand the significance of the island that obstructed the 2nd leg. We found that is was necessary to hug the island to avoid the adverse current. Someone put it perfectly, "It is like a NASCAR race, you got to get a position against the island and keep it." There were two races, the second of which finished downwind as a front came through. As we were putting the boat to bed, Susie showed me the spinnaker pole that had split near one of the ends. What to do? Dave Watts heard the conversation and offered his extra pole. Problem solved by an instance of overwhelming generosity of the members of the Lightning Class. First lesson of the SC: bring at least two spinnaker poles.

Later I found out that Tommy Allen had a full van of replacement equipment. More on that later.

After showers and a change into dry clothes the Saturday night buffet was a welcome relaxed evening. Sunday morning we showed up ready to race until we saw how hard it was blowing. Our aching muscles from being over-taxed the day before were screaming for sympathy as we watched several people begin to derig their boats. I asked one long time class member what he was going to do. The response "If they race, I'm going to stand on the bank and watch the fun." Time for us to derig. The RC canceled the remaining race shortly thereafter, awards were presented and the caravan started south to Miami.

When we arrived at Coral Reef YC it was another warm, sunny, shorts type of day. We met more wonderful folks, adjusted this and that, drilled more holes and relaxed our still stiff arms and legs. Equipment was passed around between boats as people repaired and realigned. Portable drills were at a premium and several batteries were dead at the day's end. The first day of racing CRYC had an elaborate breakfast buffet, and that evening a cookout at the Coconut Grove Sailing Club a short drive away from CRYC. The next morning there was no breakfast, but a buffet lunch when we finished sailing and no box lunches were ever provided. Food was always excellent with plenty for all, but we found it confusing as to when we were going to be fed or when we should supply our own.

While most people sailed three races on Tuesday, we sailed only one and a half. We were terminated by an evasive maneuver going to the leeward mark that resulted in a roll to windward and a long swim in Biscayne Bay (another first for us in the Lightning). When I came up for air, I found Susie in the water and Kimberly on the board, DRY! She was keeping the boat from turtling and had just climbed over the topside. Quick girl, our daughter. However, she got her share of swimming when I told her to get in the water and help her mother as I climbed on to the centerboard (no dummy me). I soon found myself in the water again to help clean up the debris, what with the spinnaker wrapped around the masthead fly, etc. It took us a while to get upright. CRYC stood by and eventually towed us until we could sail by ourselves. We thank them for their help and feel we can now recover ourselves without assistance in the future. 75-degree water is not a bad place to learn how to do these things.

The second day of sailing found us untangled, put back together, and ready for another day on the water. As we were about to leave the dock, a manatee was swimming around our boat poking his nose out of the water and watching us curiously with big brown eyes. He slowly came up right beside our boat and let Kimberly stroke his head. What a treat! After sailing and the buffet lunch, the awards ceremonies were held just outside the club where the lack of attendance puzzled us.

It was now on to St. Petersburg and the last leg of this ever exciting and challenging SC. We arrived in St Pete in the early afternoon knowing we had to change the spreader that had been damaged in the Miami capsize. Brian told us the day before that we were lucky not to have lost the mast during the second day at Miami. OK, where to find a spreader? Ask Tom Allen who dug around in the most incredible "if you need it, I've got it" traveling van where he found the proper part and, best of all, proceeded to help us install the spreaders before he was off to help another.

Second lesson of the SC: Bring at least one set of extra spreaders and spreader tips. When we put the mast up we found that, as Johnny Cash sang in one of his songs, the holes had all gone away. Nothing seemed to fit, especially the lowers. We finally got it all together, but it sure wasn't right as proved by our performance on the racecourse our first day in St. Pete. That night, Greg Fisher spent a looonnnnggggg time helping us make everything better, probably arriving at his own cocktail party late (we never made it). He insisted that we sail by him on Saturday to see if it looked OK from off the boat. We were unable to make contact on the water but when we arrived on shore he said to change some of

the partner blocks. We never had a chance to see the results of his second effort because the race on Sunday was canceled. I really thank everyone for being so generous with time and knowledge. We feel we were on the right track.

A quick trip to the main desk with our visa card gave us a temporary card to use for charges while visiting. This was very useful for a breakfast buffet on Friday, daily lunch at the sailing center (across the street from the club and where we launched our boats) as well as evening entertainment and light suppers at their famous bar. Donuts and coffee were provided every morning at the sailing center and the final banquet was a grand affair with a good choice of food. The night of the banquet was our daughter's birthday (you'll have to ask her which one), and Brian Hayes, as amusing fund raiser extraordinaire, managed to get all 200 people to sing Happy Birthday to her. What a great group to give our daughter one of her best ever birthdays!

We were sorry to leave St. Pete and all the fun and memories we had on the Southern Circuit. However as we drove north we kept the northern cold at bay by sharing among ourselves accounts about the races, the clubs, the people, the parties, the winds, and all things in general.

Oh, one last thing, we finished off the last day of the Southern Circuit by ordering a new boat.

The moral of this story is that the Southern Circuit is a great event and everyone should participate. Susie and Kimberly told me that they were going in 2001 even if I didn't. Guess we're on track. All I need to do now is get the new boat and go at it this summer. If it is ready, maybe we'll stop by Montreal for the Canadian Championship on July 1 and 2. Can't be too far out of the way, can it?

HOW TO FULLY ENJOY THE CALIFORNIA CIRCUIT

LESSON #3: If you have extra chairs, you run out of beer sooner!

Wednesday morning started with some bad news. Our third crew couldn't make the race because of work. Despite about fifty phone calls, Dan and I couldn't dig one up, so we were ordered to carry a huge cooler full of beer for weight. The twentytwo mile marathon race is truly a unique and challenging event. The first hour was upwind from the middle of San Diego Bay. Sunny skies, winds were very steady at 8-10 knots and the fleet stayed tight.

We got into a little duel with the team of Dr. Joel Humphrey, Mark Allen. and Mark Dan Wray. "the pincher" was driving our boat and was right at home in the flat water as we had the lead near the bay entrance. As we sailed out of the harbor, we could see the fog bank

rolling over Point Loma, very ominous. The winds accelerate around the point and the next thirty minutes was a screaming spinnaker reach as we headed out into the Pacific.


The next challenge was to determine which of the dozen government marks was the turning mark. LESSON #4: Studying the NOAA chart for an hour last night pays off big! Apparently a few boats behind us didn't get lesson #4 and sailed well below our course to the wrong mark. We were very nervous, since they were the locals! I swore to Danny that we were right, and soon we rounded with a fourminute lead! The next two hours was a beat up the coast; a game of "get as close to shore as you dare to escape the current, but beware THE KELP BEDS!" Scott Finkboner, with crew Tom Davies and Jill Carman went way inshore, and seemed to be gaining on us. We try to cover, but keep getting caught in the kelp. We learned later that Scott had mapped out the kelp the day before! This would be LESSON #5.

This whole time we watch Gerry Neuberger, sailing with Sandra Neuberger and Dan Burton, stay a little offshore and grab the lead. Suddenly we are caught inside a large wave (call it "surf" at this point!) and have a sixfoot breaker barreling down at us! We foot off for speed to "punchthrough," but white water crashes over the boat about chest high. Danny gets thrown against the afterdeck, I cling to the shrouds. Then the boat drops out from under us and lands with a tremendous bang! We are both stunned but the boat stays intact (thank you Dave Nickels!) The Neubergers saw the whole thing and got to view most of our centerboard!

LESSON #6: Don't follow Finkboner unless you know what you are doing!

We open the bailers, hike hard, sail fast, and retake the lead just before the last turning mark. The sun comes back out for the reach into Mission Bay. A little chug on the "jugorum" and then pop the chute. We feel very lucky to have all nine spinnakers behind us! Soon we cross the finish line in front of the club with the smell of chili cooking! The rum is quickly finished. Neuberger is 2nd, Finkboner 3rd; Joel Humphrey is 4th, followed by Mike Brewer who, I believe, sailed the entire race shirtless! John DeBenedetti is 6th, Al Poindexter 7th, then Dave Webber 8th, Steven Davis 9th, and Wendell Harter in 10th. If you have never done distance racing in a Lightning, it is a blast, and you have to get out here and try it!

EVENT #3, "The Ocean Series". It was my turn to drive again, and our third was Paul Galvez, a nimble sailor who taught me how to sail an I14. Three great races, long windwardleeward. The second race featured an exciting downwind duel between us and Mark Allen that made the Prada/ America One duels look like child's play. Gerry Neuberger, last year's circuit winner, had fixed his tuning problems from King Harbor and had great boat speed. A win in race two put Gerry one point behind us, with Mark Allen another point back going into the final race. Gerry rolled over us at the start but then turned around to restart, allowing us to grab the bullet and our third "event win." We were done early enough for some extracurricular activities; the Michigan group went surfing! That evening, Scott Finkboner prepared an amazing meal of teriyaki grilled Mahi Mahi. LESSON #7: Scott makes the best Mahi Mahi in the world; this alone would make

Final day, five races inside Mission Bay. Danny "the pincher" drove this one; our third was Yvonne Galvez, another 114 sailor. Courses were short so the fleet stayed very tight; this was the most competitive racing of the Circuit. We stumbled in the early races with finishes of 3,3,2 thanks to being over early and a spectacular capsize trying to get the chute down after a downwind finish.

Gerry Neuberger had three bullets and looked untouchable. We won the last two races and watched Al Poindexter come within a half boat length of spoiling Gerry's day. Gerry held onto a 4,3 to win the tiebreaker for the Bay Series.

At the awards ceremony, Dan finally wore his "Make 7, Up Yours" tee shirt as we accepted a truckload of trophies for the 2000 California Circuit! Second overall were coskippers Joel

Humphrey and Mark Allen. In third was Scott Finkboner. Problems with a new mast in King Harbor kept Gerry Neuberger back in fourth. Al Poindexter, sailing with Edrie Romans and Derek Poindexter rounded out the top five. Our capsize did win us the "bowling trophy;" this was the first time this award went to the Circuit winners! The Susan M. Arnold trophy for the highest placing woman sailing every race, went to Sandra Neuberger.

Many thanks to all who helped organize this event, King Harbor YC, Coronado YC and Mission Bay YC. Special thanks to Kirk and Edna Johnson for lending us their boat, I'm sure they enjoyed watching it win. The California Circuit is truly a "must do,, event; it was great getting to know all the new faces out here. Don't forget LESSON #1:YOU HAVE TO GET OUT HERE AND SAIL THE CALIFORNIA CIRCUIT!

KIDS TAKE CHARGE IN SOUTH AMERICA

Salinas Yacht Club, Salinas, Ecuador, April 2022 The 45th South American Championship was held in Salinas, Ecuador on April 2022. For the first time we tried a boatrotation system, similar to the one used at the Youth Worlds. We decided to try this format because it is very difficult and costly to transport boats around. Also, by rotating boats all teams, both locals and visitors, would have equal opportunity.

The purpose of the regatta was to increase participation from all countries, and to motivate kids to sail Lightnings. Thus, each country was allowed to bring one youth team and two senior teams. Just looking at the attendance we feel that the regatta format was a success: all countries except Brasil showed up with at least two teams: Argentina (2), Chile (3), Colombia (3), Peru (3) and Ecuador (8) for a total of 19 boats, out of which five were youth teams. The system was widely praised by all competitors and it was decided that we should continue to use it in the next South Americans.

Now the most important stuff, results:

Champions: (Colombia) Sebastian Higuera, Nicolas Deeb, Camilo Salcedo 21 years old Runners Up: (Ecuador) Miguel Plaza, Jose Gonzales, Cristian Gonzalez 22 years old Fourth place: (Colombia) Loreana Jacob, Jessica Jacob 17 years old Fifth place: (Ecuador) Carlos Plaza, Santiago Garcia, Alfredo Marin 19 years old Eighth place: (Ecuador) Juan Santos Jr., Miguel Mardonez, Enrique GranjaJr. 16 years old Ninth place: (Peru) Dereck Marston, Leslie Marston, Rafael Verand 17 years old.

Out of the 19 participants, a total of 11 crews were made up completely by kids younger than 22 years.

You'd think these were all inexperienced kids. But then again, Tito Gonzales (CHI) and his world championship crew Pablo and Claus had to fight hard and could only make it to third place after a tight duel with Sebastian Higuera (COL) and Miguel Plaza Jr. (ECU). Also, other seasoned sailors had to give way to the kids, like Juan Santos (ECU) who finished 13th and Hector Longarella (ARG) who finished 14th after having just completed a successful Southern Circuit campaign in which they finished 8th.

These results are very promising for the future of the class in South America. We believe that each District Commodore has a huge responsibility and needs to continue to work very hard to incorporate youth crews to the class, which will guarantee we'll see Lightnings for years to come.

As you can see, the results were super tight and the racing was nose to tail classic Lightning action.


We had a great contingent from Thunder Bay, Winnipeg and Dryden and we would like to thank them for coming all the way down for the event.



2000 NORTH AMERICAN CHAMPIONSHIP

Ned Roseberry and Ched Proctor

The North American Championship in Annapolis promised to be a highly competitive event. There were about 98 teams there, including about 6 South Americans and the current World Champion, Tito Gonzalez of Chile. The practice race was a mess with a ton of motor-

boats out on beautiful Cheaspeake Bay. Fortunately, a front blew through for the qualifiers. The 25+ knots and massive puffs, made it a struggle for all the people who had small crews. It was a challenge. There were several capsizes and gear failures. Sunday - The first day of qualifiers produced two very similar windy races. We took a middle/pin start and worked the favoring left side, as the breeze tended to shift left near the shore at the top of the beat. Generally, in a breeze out of the north in Annapolis, the left side of the course is heavily favored. In order to get the fleet to spread evenly along the line, the race committee favored the boat end by as much as 40 degrees. Many competitors were OCS as everyone fought for the weather end. In the qualifiers, since you count three of the four races, one bad one hurts. They were calling six and seven over at a time! We managed to avoid the carnage and scored a 3 and 1.

Monday brought the second day of qualifiers. A terrible storm front persisted with rain and light wind interspersed with squalls. We had an on-shore postponement as the breeze alternated between nothing and 25 knots. When we did get to race, the left dominance paid off and we carded a 1. In race four, the breeze died a bit and got shiftier, but we carded another 1st. So we ended up winning the NA Qualification series with a 3,1,1,1, discarding a three, and counting three points. That sounds great, BUT in recent memory, no one has ever won the qualifiers and then won the NAs. We insisted on debunking this myth. While most of the top guns were in the first flight, a couple of mishaps (broken gear, OCSs, capzises) relegated some of the familiar faces to the Prseident and Governor Fleets. Those eliminated from the championship division included, Jim Allen (2nd last year), Brian Hayes (with Greg Fisher), with an OCS

and DNF in the qualifiers, and Brian Taboada (sailing with Ned's wife as front crew, 1st in 1995!) and the Ace of Salinas, Ecuador, Juan Santos.

Tuesday - GOOD STORY ... RACE ONE started in a light northwesterly. We were punched off the line, played a couple shifts up the first beat, and rounded the weather mark in second, although the breeze was dying. OOPS! We noticed we were over early, as the weather mark boat displayed our number, and retired, along with Bill Healy. We teamed up to pray to the weather Gods to have the wind die. It worked. The RACE was ABANDONED as the breeze died totally. It was a good race to sit out! The race was re-started in a light sea breeze. The right was heavily favored. We won the boat and tacked immediately. Initially we led to the right, but elected to go back to starboard and cover the left fleet. We lost a couple to the right to finish 6th. The race winner, Sean Fidler failed to check in at the start and ended up with a 20% penalty so it was really a 5th as only four people had less points at the end of the day.

Wednesday - RACE TWO: As we arrived at the race course, the breeze was from the south at 8-10 knots but quickly built to 15. We were well focused on the job of figuring out what the changing weather was up to. Large clouds were developing over the land to the right. The weather forecast suggested wild storms coming from the right. So, electing to prepare for a right shift we started near the weather end of the line, and took all early opportunities to blast to the

right. There was a HUGE SHIFT RIGHT and now 20 knots. We close reached into the weather mark on starboard tack. A few boats that went right a little sooner than us were ahead. The wind went MORE RIGHT. We had the spinnaker pole almost on the headstay on port jibe for the run. Initially we were planing wildly, but half way down the leg the wind droppedto around 10 knots. We rounded the port mark of the gate in about 8th, played a bunch of little shifts up the middle left. The breeze continued to become lighter and settled back into the northwest after the passing storm. We rounded the weather mark in second place, behind Bill Mauk. The run was challenging with puffs coming first from one side then the other. Several boats gained considerably because there was more wind filling from behind. We felt fortunate to maintain second to the leeward mark. As we started the final beat, the wind had shifted to the left considerably. We rounded starboard mark of the gate. We tacked to port as soon as

Bill did. We took two short starboard tack hitches at the same time Bill did, but stayed right of him. With the help of current, from about a quarter mile to the finish line, on port tack, we laid the fin-

ish while Bill over stood, so we won the race.

RACE THREE -We played shifts up the middle right. The majority of the fleet, on the left, appeared to have a velocity and a shift advantage on us. We kept taking short starboard tack hitches whenever the shifty breeze would let us. We followed closely behind Bill Healy. Bill rounded the mark first or second while we were two places back,

right behind Bill Fastiggi. We luffed to get over Bill, failed, and ended up with 10 boats overlapped on our port side, due to the distance lost. We actually faired well in this position and rounded the starboard gate first, inside of Bill Healy. We held on starboard tack because we felt that we were lifted. Bill Healy tacked to port to clear out. He won the race, but for us this was the beat from Hell. There was a big right favor as the wind persisted in shifting right. We got totally mixed up in the Governor's Cup, which was sailing their first beat. We rounded the top mark in what seemed about 20th. This had to be some record for number of boats lost through bad decisions. We ground back to 10th including loosing Steve Hayden through bad tactics at the finish line. We ended the race, kicking ourselves for squandering a first.

RACE FOUR - Wind was 20 knots. The line was very long. We started 1/3 of the way from the leeward end. The length of the line produced huge separation from the part of the fleet that started near the weather end. We were flat out hiking on starboard tack for the first five minutes. Then the majority of the fleet tacked to port on a left shift. The right seemed to be at an advantage shift wise. The left was at an advantage velocity wise. We were right in the middle. The left velocity died out near the top of the beat. We

felt like we were the last boat to make it out of the left alive. We rounded about sixth, played few shifts on run to close on the leaders. On the sec-

ond beat we found some extra speed in the strong wind, as we hoofed it to the right side of the course. Our speed enabled us to climb right up over Don Barrett and Sean Fidler while sailing on port tack out of the port mark of the gate. A couple of others ahead of us tacked to starboard and this proved to be a mistake for them. With this we moved into second behind Tito Gonzalez. Tito was too far ahead to catch, so we spent the rest of the race defending second. Tito had started near the weather end of the line and tacked to port early on. He was in phase with the shifts and had a large lead at the weather mark and was never challenged. The current World Champion showed that he still has it! At the completion of racing on Wednesday, we are the only consistent boat. We had ALL TOP TENS, and only 19 total points, where others have big numbers. This can be attributed to the fact that the breeze was shifting wildly.

Thursday - RACE FIVE -The day started in a dying breeze again. It shifted right. We were in the middle and got shafted. The wind died and the last fleet passed the first fleet, as we all got swept with current. The race was abandoned. Now for the REAL RACE FIVE. It was a real gut wrencher. The Race Committee waited a couple of hours for the sea breeze to gain dominance. Since

a layer of clouds kept the sun from really heating up the land, it remained light and very spotty. In the late afternoon they finally decided it was the best we were going to get and started a race. Since Bill Fastiggi and Regatta Chairman Grotheer were our two closest competitors we needed to avoid letting them get too far away. Local Knowledge said the right would likely have an advantage. The left leeward end of the line was favored. We started just above the leeward end pile up and to leeward of Bill Fastiggi. Bill seemed to be playing the start to have us pinned and to tack to the right first. He did tack right away and we followed in a couple of boat lengths. After a minute or so, we fell into a light spot with a big header that Bill never seemed to get. So we tacked to starboard. We went right back to port as soon as the wind would let us, not wanting to let the critical competitors get too far away. The wind was really spotty. Bill had continued on port until now, and found a little more velocity than we did.

To show how spotty it was, we had Master's Champ Colin Park on our hip. Because I figured that Bill might tack as soon as he could get to us, I wanted to make sure we were clean to tack. So I pinched up to put Colin away so we could tack across his bow to escape Bill's cover when necessary. We were initially successful as we put Colin in our wake a boat length behind. But then Colin got a puff and climbed right back out to weather. Then, just as I feared, Bill was able to tack to starboard, and would have crossed by a length or so. We tried to tack even and to leeward of Bill while Colin tacked on our lee bow. So the situation didn't seem



real good, especially since Bill was bow out on us. But our turn had come. We found a little extra something to climb out of this tight spot. We sailed right up over Colin and up in front of Bill to gain some semblance of control. While all of this was going on, Grotheer was losing, further to the right where local knowledge said the wind would come. The boats on the left were finding it to their liking, and were far ahead. Bill Faude had been over early, restarted after about a minute, and went hard left to round the weather mark in second.

Even though we were not in the ideal spot, we were able to round the weather mark in good tactical position with most of the major competitors well behind us. The rest of the race was a real difficult test as the wind remained light. The runs were tricky with the wide jibing angles caused by light wind and adverse current. The wind always looked stronger to the south or left side, where port jibe took us. However the ebb current was right on the bow on starboard jibe. Apparently the current was stronger near the leeward mark. We went for the wind by jibing to port early on both runs. Bill Fastiggi did the same, so we successfully stayed between him and the leeward mark. This seemed in doubt several times as he took a short starboard jibe hitch and for a while found a puff. But, by being patient, we eventually found something to get back across

him. The leaders were far ahead and we couldn't identify them all. We suspected that no one ahead of us was close to us overall but were not sure where Bill Healy was. So the drama continued.

On the beats, the left (south side) seemed to be pretty favored with stronger breeze. On the second beat we

were able to ignore Bill Fastiggi because he was a ways behind, and had a good battle with a few boats. We caught Sean Fidler, who was just ahead of us at the leeward mark. Then, on the second run, Sean stayed on starboard jibe first, while we took port jib, again liking the look of the breeze to the south. Sean gained about 100 meters on us, to round the leeward mark well ahead. Somehow, on the last beat we got close to Sean again. I had thought I had spotted Bill Healy among the leaders (unfortunately for Bill I was wrong). So since we figured Healy was close on points, I felt that we really needed to pick

off as many boats as we could. We had two possible victims as we neared the finish. The wind had picked up to about ten knots for the final beat. Dave Peck was close ahead but to leeward on starboard. Sean ducked us on port tack. Since we weren't quite laying the finish, we tacked in order to pin Sean beyond the layline. This we did successfully. We ended up close reaching in on starboard to pick Sean off. This was a really exciting finish after a trying race.

Tito Gonzalez again played the course beautifully to lead the whole race. As of now we are winning with all top tens -6,1,10,2,9 and the next closest boat would be Fastiggi and Hayden. They have BIG throwouts now, and as it stands, with only one race to go, the only way we could LOSE the regatta was if, and only if, Fastiggi won the race. If we were 9th or worse, it wouldn't matter where other people finished.

Friday, there was no wind, and so no sailing. WE WIN!

Much of the reason for our success is the amount of time that our team of Kathryn Josenhans, Ned and I have spent together racing Lightnings and other boats over the last few years. As a team, each know the other's strengths and we work well together to make everything function. From the experience of the many regattas we have sailed together in the past, we know where those places of strength lay. As a result we were probably a little more relaxed than most of our competitors. We experience our moments of tension but the chemistry seems to be right to get the job done.

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
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#11981 Comes Home Again

I first saw "The Black Boat" at Higgins Lake, Michigan in 1973. I was thirteen that year and Mike Pearl and Dave Helmick asked me to sail with them in the 1973 NA's in Tawas. Pronounced Taywasss by Florida folks. That was 27 years ago!

I went up, and, with Eric Doutt's help I was headed east on M-55 without a care in the world. Any destination with a Lightning in tow is a good one!

We had a set of Levenson sails made by Rick Grajerena and a yellow spinnaker. My job was the pointed end. It was the windiest regatta I have ever sailed in! Boats were starting in force 8 winds with mains only.

We won the Fallon Trophy for being the last boat to qualify into the Championship Fleet. One extremely windy race we were fighting it out for last. Mike hit the finish mark and by the time we rounded we were dead last. Welcome to the Big Leagues. We did stay upright for the whole series. Not content with that much sailing, we went on to sail two more weeks at CORK.

Ah, then the next summer in Florida. Mike Alexander and I had the times of our lives our senior year in high school. We sailed "The Black Boat" what seems like every day. We had a lobster trap (not a Booby Trap) out at marker 24 in Biscayne Bay. We would disappear for hours, but as long as we brought back some tail (lobster tail, that is) nobody seemed to care!

One windy day we left Hurricane Harbor on a full plane. We were about three minutes out of the harbor when the biggest, nastiest black cloud I have ever seen appeared. Mike and I looked at each other and nodded. Too much wind for the chute. The cloud descended upon us. The jib sheet blew from my hand, and the knot at the bitter end jammed in the cleat. Mike had the same experience with the main. I knew the only chance for survival was to pull the centerboard all the way and head for the back of the boat. Mike was already on the transom. I made room for myself on the aft deck behind the Crosby rigging. White water was everywhere and a geyser gushed out of the centerboard trunk and up over the spreader bar. A rooster tail from the rudder started twenty-five feet behind the boat and went up what seemed like ten feet. The wind blew force 11, and when it let up, we sheeted back in and made it to the club without tacking. It was the most exhilarating sailing experience of my life.

Years passed. August 23, 1993, the eye wall of Hurricane Andrew destroyed just about everything I owned. My girlfriend left me, and my truck was mangled. I even had to camp out in Bill

Alderman's back yard in a tent. BUT HECK, THE UPSIDE LOOKED GREAT. "The Black Boat" easily made it through force 12 this time. She had changed hands a few times, but Steve C (was it Calloway?) owned her by then. The boat was real banged up; she had flown about 100 feet in a twister. I bought her after that and she spent two years in my garage. I rebuilt the deck - being careful to leave her well-earned battle-scars. You should see Fay Regan with a Sawzall!

I sold the boat to Reid Hutchinson and he worked on the boat forever, fairing all the primer I had painted on. Then he moved and sold it, and then it was sold again. I lost track of the boat. A couple of years ago, I left Miami to move to Tampa to work with my two brothers. I ran into Jeff Linton, and he told me "The Black Boat" was up here now. Rod Koch had bought it. I smiled and told him if the boat ever came up for sale to let me know.

Well, darn if I don't have my old buddy back in my garage. Thanks to everyone who has helped me get her going. It won't be long before she will set sail again. PROMISE.

Don Schregardus with crew Stan Fuller & Paul Howald, placing 9th and Dan Hertzer with crew Cathy Hendricks and Terry Sowers, placing 12th.

Christina Hedrick was the only Leatherlips sailor to travel to Nashville, TN the first weekend of November to crew for the Bluenose Regatta, She was middle crew for Batton Kennon and his girlfriend Mary Summers on 12505. Batton and Mary are from Memphis and it was very interesting meeting the other southern gentlemen sailors from Memphis. Batton, Mary and Christina had one race where they placed 17th out of 45 boats. It was very exciting for them to have done that well in at least one race with all the "rock stars" at this regatta!

Locally Leatherlips skippers who raced this year were: Kurt Andrews, Eric Brandt, Carl Clipp, Jamie Diamond, Christina Hedrick, Dan Hertzer, George Hodge, Don Schregardus, & Ralph Zimmer.

Lightning skippers who qualified for year 2000 Leatherlips awards were:

Dan Hertzer for Spring Series Lightning A & B races placing first, and Don Schregardus taking second. Memorial Day Races resulted in Dan Hertzer placing first, Eric Brandt placing second and Don Schregardus placing third. For the Summer 1A series Don Schregardus placed first with Dan Hertzer taking second and for Summer 1B series Don Schregardus placed first. For the 4th of July series Kurt Andrews placed first with Don Schregardus taking second. For the 4th of July pursuit races, where the different club classes competed against each other, Don-Schregardus placed 2nd out of 16 boats and Ralph Zimmer placed 8th. I think we were all spoiled to have the class office in Columbus for the last 30 years or more. I will personally miss Karen and her son Evan very much. It was always wonderful to see Cathy at Leatherlips. She is such a fun, positive person and was a great addition to our fleet! We wish both Karen and Cathy well and boy, are there ever a couple of lucky fleets to be getting them!

Close competitive sailing was the keyword for Lightning sailing for the Metedeconk River fleet, as a tradition of topnotch sailing continued in 2000.

As always, the fleet begins its season outside the Metedeconk, with Jim Carson, Mitch Hnatt and Paul Gelenitis attending the Southern Circuit, and finishing 12th, 13th and 14th respectively. Closer to home, at the Long John Regatta in Red Bank, New Jersey, Jim Carson continued to break in his new boat in style, finishing 2nd; Keith Taboada (3rd) and Brian Taboada (6th), and Mitch Hnatt (8th) also contributed to a fine Metedeconk showing (Greg Kinzel, Jarrett Lynn and Mike Hnatt also attended). The Central Atlantic Districts was held in Riverton, New Jersey in June. Six fleet members attended: Brian Taboada, Jim Carson, Mitch and Mike Hnatt, Paul Gelenitis, and Don Brennan. Brian fared the best (5th), while Jim, Mitch and Paul all finished in the top ten.

Fleet sailing was quite competitive with spring, summer and fall series all crowning different champions. Mitch Hnatt took honors in the spring, followed by brother Mike and father and son team of Don and Andrew Brennan. Paul Gelenitis reclaimed the summer championship series, reeling off a string of August race victories to eclipse the early lead of Mitch Hnatt. Mike Hnatt took third. The fall series was won by Greg Kinzel, with Jim Carson and Andrew Brennan following. Mitch Hnatt sailed a perfect series (won every race he was scored) to win the prestigious BBYRA championship, breaking Paul Gelenitis' recent strangle-hold on that title. Jim Carson (2nd), Bill Bogardus (3rd), Jarrett Lynn (5th) and Don Brennan (6th) also qualified for the series.

Metedeconk continued its strong regatta showing in the summer and fall, with eight participants in the New Jersey State Championship, held in Barnegat Light. Paul Gelenitis fared best (4th), with Keith Taboada (5th) and Jim Carson (7th) finishing strong. The Junior States were held at Metedeconk with club juniors Matt Glowacki and Courtney O'Conner finishing 1, 2. Brian Taboada (5th) and Jim Carson (13th) attended the Atlantic Coasts at Cedar Point, Connecticut. The North Americans in Annapolis had less Metedeconk participation than typical, with all three finishing in the Presidents Cup (Carson: 6th, Gelenitis 12th and Mike Hnatt 19th). Jim Carson finished 7th in the Masters and Andrew Brennan 10th in the Juniors. Later in the fall at Annapolis, in the Frigid Digit regatta, Jim Carson returned to take 7th, followed by Ryan Dunn (8th), Mitch Hnatt (9th) and Greg Kinzel (16th). Mike Buczkowski (6th) and Jim Carson (13th) still couldn't get enough, sailing the Borderline regatta in North Carolina in late October.

As Metedeconk enters the millennium, a metamorphosis is undergoing. The fleet has had a history of top notch achievements on the national regatta scene, which has led many of its best sailors away from Metedeconk's waters. The fleet remains strong however, reenergized by a series of second generation club members, led by new Fleet Captain Mike Hnatt. The enthusiasm and comradeship is very high. Though most of the fleet sailors are dominated by the 20 and 30 something types, local legends Jim Carson and Dave Ruiter are not to be trifled with, especially on a day were tactics are at a premium. Twelve different Metedeconk skippers sailed in regattas outside the club, the most in memory and a tribute to the interest in Lightning sailing within, Boats 11411 and 11800 are out of the fleet at last, after giving some 30 years of top racing. Only Dave Ruiter's 11894 and Mike Hnatt's 12209 remain from the vintage Lippincott mold which formed the basis of Metedeconk sailing and success for so many years. The page has turned but the future story appears to be better than ever.

Fleet 50 sailed from late March to early November. We had great participation and fun. And to cap it all off we showed strong growth!

Fleet 50's 2000 season started with the annual meeting and banquet in late January hosted again by Stuart and Sondra White. This was a

While we felt badly for our friends who drive 8 plus hours to come each year (Jack Jones, Dick Hallagan, and Chandler Owen), we felt gratified by the level of Fleet 50 participation (16 boats). Fishing Bay's Ron Buchanan sailing with brother Bucky and Suzie Gilbert won the regatta. Fleet 50's Frank Gallagher was second and was awarded the perpetual Doc Gilbert trophy. Ted Hunting did very well finishing 5th. Stuart White and Jeff Storck deserve special mention. Stuart organized a filet mignon dinner for us, and Jeff used his own truck to pickup the gas grills on Saturday.

There were 16 races in the PRSA spring series. The team of Stuart White, Sondra White, and Kurt Raidy sailed every race and won the series with half the points of the next finisher. After Stuart was Frank Gallagher, Jim Dillard, the team of Nabeel Alsalam, Scott Bradford, Russell Roberts, and Steve Gregg (one point behind), the team of Paul Maher, Ben Kuykendall, and Elizabeth, and a tie between Joe Warren and Jeff Storck. Eleven boats sailed at least once in the series and seven qualified by sailing more than half. Nabeel tips his hat to Steve Gregg who improved the performance of 14096.

Since Dixie District's own Fleet 329 was hosting the North American Championships, there was particular interest in qualifying for this rare opportunity. So, nine of the 20 boats in the Dixie District Championships hosted by SMSA's Fleet 508 were Fleet 50 boats hopeful of qualifying. Then, 5 of these participated in the North American Championships in Annapolis.

Frank Gallagher sailed with Albacore hotshot Joanna Byron and heavy air specialist Skip Hirsh. They finished 8th in the Dixie Districts,

missed the President's Cup fleet by a hair, and in the NAs, finished 9th in the Governor's Cup. Craig has freelanced for Jeff Storck, Nabeel Alsalam, and others during the season when John couldn't sail and won the "Best Crew" award for 1999 and is in high demand in the fleet. to complete the team sailing for the NAs. Jim was feeling slow early in the year, but he bought new sails and has paid a lot of attention to the rig tuning and it is paying off as can be seen from the fall series results.

The PRSA Leukemia/Presidents Cup kicks off the fall season after Labor Day. Of the 16 Lightnings competing, 12 were from our fleet. Winds on both days were light, 4 to 7 kts on Saturday from the Northeast and 0 to 7 kts on Sunday. The skippers who did the best were alert to the frequent wind shifts; much depended on being on the correct side of the starting line. Jamie Brickell from Fleet 329 won 3 of the 5 races in his new Allen #15016. Frank Gallagher was second but challenged Jamie all the way, rounding the last leeward mark just behind Jamie. Whoever made it to the finish first would win the regatta. Jamie went right toward the airport where thermals off the hot runways are reliable, whereas Frank had to gamble and went left. Jamie won. We were pleased that Don Behrens ad Dave Meiser from the new Solomon's Fleet 509 joined us.

On July 1, we tried something new; a down-river cruise and picnic to historic Fort Washington, which is about 9 miles down the river from where we launch. The idea was to have a social event to include wives and friends who don't race with us. Five boats participated: Nabeel Alsalam, Paul Maher, Jeff Storck, Ben Good, and Dave Pyle. Joe Warren, the main organizer of the event, and Tony Vernon volunteered to tag along in a powerboat in case the wind died. On the way south we had a beautiful northwest breeze and a nearly two-hour spinnaker run. On the return, an unexpected breeze came up north of the Wilson Bridge making for a refreshing sail to the marina

In early July, Fleet 50 hosted the first Lightning LABS—a two day coaching session run by Bill Fastiggi. We learned how to tune our rigs

and practice racing strategy. Everyone learned something from the on-land spinnaker handling demonstration; we launched and practiced tacking and starting (in current). Back on shore, Bill led a chalk talk to review what we did well and not so well on the water. Jeff Storck was the organizer behind the event and must be credited for the idea of ordering ribs for dinner on Saturday.

Lightning Fleet 50 struck a deal with the PRSA Albacore Fleet. If they would run RC for our Potomac Cup each year, we would run RC for one of their regattas. This year we ran their North American Championships in Rehoboth on Columbus Day weekend. Six Fleet 50 members participated. Nabeel Alsalam was the regatta chair, Frank Gallagher was mark boat captain, Paul Maher was signal officer, Ben Kuykendall was recorder, and Pat McGee and Tony Vernon were rescue boat captain and crew. We ran seven races with mile-long legs over 3 days. One the final day we ran the seventh race in a 20-25 knot breeze. Only 11 of the 30-some Albacores ventured out but the rest got a real show from the shore of screaming planing reaches and death rolls to windward.

The Fall series consisted of 20 races. The team of Jim Dillard, Nelson Pemberton, and Carl Wilson won, but the racing was so close that going into our second to last Sunday one point separated first and second place boats, fourth and fifth were tied, as was seventh and eighth. After the Dillard team it was the Alsalam-Bradford-Roberts team, Frank Gallagher, the Forman-Goode-Cody team, and Pat McGee (only 1.6 points behind Ben and equally few ahead of Paul Maher). Jeremy Terr jumped on Nabeel's boat one Sunday and on Pat's another Sunday, and helped both have particularly good showings those days. Unfortunately for us, Jeremy has joined the Peace Corps and is heading to one of the "stan" republics in central Asia.

Twelve boats sailed at least once and 9 qualified. The Pat McGee

team sailed every race and the team of Paul Maher, Ben Kuykendall, and Elizabeth sailed or did RC duty in every race. The team of Joe Warren, John Hart, Emily Pavilon, and Tony Vernon battled it out with the team of Jeff Storck and Jill Williamson for seventh and eighth places; Joe squeaked out a one point margin for seventh. Congratulations to the team of Rick Welch, Cathy Bleakly, and Gigi McLaughlin who demonstrated much skill in this series after their skipper's very short time crewing for Jeff. Rick's experience in the Wednesday evening practice sessions really showed. New member Bob Wilbur also started sailing his boat late in the series. Unfortunately, Ben Adams and Brian Nestor's last Sunday race was marred by a collision with a submerged log, which put a nasty hole in their boat. However, Fleet 50 epoxy experts pitched in to help Ben fix it and the boat is all set for the spring.

As the season ended, it found Frank Gallagher as Fleet Champion, which is not new for him but is something he works hard to achieve each year. Nabeel Alsalam with Russell Robert and Scott Bradford were runner up. This is a great accomplishment for Nabeel's team as this was only his third year in the Lightning Class.

Sandy Huntsman captured the Fleet Championship for the second year running with his consistent sailing. 

WHY 2000

It is now time to look back over the 2000, end of the millennium, sailing season. Members could purchase a new buoy for \$60 and have it dedicated to someone as a memorial. Names are inscribed on both the buoy and on a memorial plaque. So far we have replaced 14 mooring buoys by this program, at no new expense to the club.

The Overall Championship of the Mansfield Sailing Club was won by Dave Ireland, with Tom Varley as Runner-Up and Bill Schamadan in third place. These three Lightning skippers dominated the Championship Series by handily defeating the participating Flying Scots in a five-race series on October 14.

Wawasee Yacht Club is home to Lightning Fleet 154. Situated in Northern Indiana, Lake Wawasee is Indiana's largest natural lake and has a heritage of organized sailboat racing dating back to the late 1800's. The Wawasee Yacht Club is a one-design sailing club with a racing season that runs from Memorial Day through Labor Day. In addition to Lightnings, Wawasee Yacht Club's other fleets include Sunfish, Lasers, E-Scows, and DN iceboats. We race primarily on weekends, and each class plays host to at least one annual regatta.

Jeff Schmahl edged by Brad Wagnon to take second place for the season. Brad finished third, Bill Allen (who sailed in every race this year) finished a very close fourth, and Alan Fox fifth. The Cobbum/Nixon/Wellington team won the coveted Cynthia's Cup, which goes to the team, regardless of class, who accumulates the most points throughout the season.

The 54th Annual Hoosier Regatta was held in early October. A horrific forecast kept many regulars from attending. Nevertheless, eleven teams braved the cold temps and high winds. Our own Brad Wagnon won his first Hoosier Regatta. Jeff Schmahl, Craig Cobbum, Jon Bennett of Pontiac, and Bill Allen finished second through fifth. Craig Cobbum won the 2000 Districts, which was hosted by Fleet 271 in Indianapolis.

We anticipate 2001 to be another great season. With at least two additional teams, and a planned clubhouse renovation, Lightning Fleet 154 continues to thrive on beautiful Lake Wawasee.





At the SSA dock, proudly flying the colors of the nations sailing in the NA's, competitors were treated to the weekly parade of the AYC Wednesday night series as

the boats reached to the finish at the Spa Creek drawbridge. This was also the day that an ESPN film crew was on the water catching all of the action for a spot on Gary Jobson's International Year in Sailing, which hopefully most of you were able to see.

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Finally, my own little perspective as a relative newcomer to the class and a first-time NA's participant—Damn, what a cool event! I am so hooked now on Lightning sailing, and especially on big regattas. See you in Vermont!

The remainder of the season mostly consisted of road events, as some of us traveled to DC for the Leukemia/President's Cup, the Solomon's One Design Invitational, and the Borderline in NC. We wrapped things up in October with the 49th Annual Frigid Digit, where we hosted 25 Lightnings and 18 Snipes in this combined fall favorite. A catered barbecue dinner, a well-stocked beer-truck, and the reggae/calypso music seemed to keep everyone in good spirits. In moderate 10 knot breeze, the regatta came down to Phil and Tom Allen, Jr., with Phil taking it with 3

There were 5 class room sessions followed by remote controlled 'Victoria' model sail boats tacking and jibing in the swimming pool. Wind was created by 4 foot tall fans at pool side. George and Ann Siegle 'drafted' the fuzzy faced guy to be their middle crew at the Saginaw Bay District Championships. The FUBAR crew of Rachel Mills and Scott Schopieray and the FINS crew of George and Ann Siegle, along with Gil Chesbro, headed north to Tawas Bay Yacht Club's regatta. Two Lansing boats, Koster and Siegle, were at Higgins Lake Boat Club's invitational regatta with their respective crews, John LeFevre and Scott Schopieray, and Ann Siegle and Jim Eckert. Blaine Severin aboard UFP (Unidentified Flying Pig) with Laura Harvey and Julie Pierce sailed at Devils Lake. Background: Fleet 481 is one of the 6 one-design fleets that constitute the Carolina Sailing Club (CarolinaSailingClub.org). The club is a racing-only club, owns race committee boats and equipment, and no real-estate. It was the first US Sailing (USYRU) One-Design Club of the Year. The club and fleet race on Kerr Lake and Lake Jordan, which are near Raleigh, Durham and Chapel Hill in central North Carolina, and club fleets frequently hold regattas on the Pamlico and Albemarle Sounds in eastern NC.

Fleet 481, also known as the Wake (County) Fleet, participates in all the club's racing events: the monthly Kerr Lake race weekends April through October, an informal race series one day a month for the same months on Lake Jordan, and a frost-bite series, bi-monthly Sundays, for the rest of the year.

The fleet is the most active Lightning fleet in the South Eastern Lightning District (SED). Fleet participation in the SED circuit (10 regattas in 2000) rises and falls over the years; this year was a little less than average – but we still provided 49 boat days of the approximately 200 total boat days

in the circuit. The biggest event on the circuit is the Fleet-run late-October Borderline Regatta. Turn-out was a record high of 40 this year, with boats coming from upper New York State and Florida, and points inbetween. Top sailors of the class regularly attend; this year's top three were Dick Halligan, Tom Allen Jr., and Steve Hayden. The Borderline also has a separately scored series that favors older boats (Hull Number Handicapping): five of the top 8 had hull numbers below 12000. The Borderline is part of a double-header with the Frigid Digit in Annapolis, and is one of the regattas on the Lighting Intersectional Series.

The fleet has grown over the last 16 months to 14 boat-owning members. New Lightning owner-members since Fall '99 are Tim Borland, Charles Moore, Richard Phillips and George Smart. We now have 10 boats that were sailed in the last year, a high for the 90's if not further back. In 2001 there will be a focus on getting all these 14 boats out racing more regularly. The fleet is not formal about non-skipper members. There are many very active crew who participate heavily in club and fleet activities; two crew are on the board of directors of the club (Joan Woods and Steve Cardoze), and one is the professional skill behind the club's web site (Nicole Knowles).

Club activism (for both 2000 and 2001: Commodore Ed Michels, Vice Commodore Michael Rees, and Rear Commodore George Smart, three directors: John Pelosi, Joan Woods, Steve Cardoze) by the fleet's most active members has handicapped fleet operations; this will start getting better in 2002.

Since the club has only racing members, club members do all the race committee work. As a result, 6 of the fleet members are experienced PRO's, and almost all fleet members and most crew have RC experience.

The year started with good intentions: the club had just restarted a frostbite program after a lapse of many years, and it was open to all boats. John Pelosi managed to sail his Lightning several times, and Ed Michels used the excuse of a freshly broken arm to stay inside and warm. The normal club racing series, April through October at Kerr Lake, had John Pelosi as the best Lightning overall, with participation by most of the other fleet members. Also new this year was an "Informal Race Series" on Lake Jordan, one day a month for the same April – October period. Scores were not kept, and John Chaplinski and Chuck Moore had the highest participation. On the SE District Circuit (two of which races were "local"), eight fleet boats participated in some manner. John Pelosi did the best of the local boats, and managed to win the end-of-year drawing for a new sail. (For the last two years, the district, instead of buying trophies, has had a participation-based drawing for a new sail and John has won it both times!)

We feel that the key to fleet health (or class health, for that matter,) is the amount of time the boats are sailed or raced. Since it's easier to improve something if you can and do measure it, we have started tracking and offer the following as our status.

Fleet Boats (481 is the boat's local fleet; and either the owner is an ILCA member, or the boat is fit or being repaired and the skipper has sailed it once in the last 3 years)
