

FLASH FORWARD The 70th Anniversary of the Lightning CLASS

The Olin Stephens designed International Lightning Class held their 70th Anniversary Regatta during the 4th of July weekend at the home of Fleet #1, Skaneateles Country Club, in the beautiful Finger Lakes region of central New York State over a nearly perfect mid-summer weekend. One hundred twenty-five boats competed, from boat #2, up through the new 15300 generation boats. The boat pictured at left, #39, was built in 1939. It was a major restoration project by Schyler Barnes that was literally finished the day before the regatta began.

The Regatta – Woodstock on the Water

The essence of this story is not about the regatta—the regatta was just an excuse for one hundred twenty-five boats to come together to celebrate the reasons the Class remains strong and viable. There wasn't much tie-dye in evidence, but there was a lot of peace and love—and a ton of fun. The Village of Skaneateles is celebrating its 150th Anniversary and is about as nice a little town as you can find anywhere, with waterfront homes that range from nice weekend farm cottages to Newportesque "Cottages."

The Skaneateles Country Club is truly a first class facility. It is every bit a country club, with what looks like a great golf course. The waterfront facility is excellent. But this club has something I've never seen at any other club, of any type—their own landing strip. It didn't look long enough to land a Citation X, but I'd be surprised if a nice twin engine turbo prop couldn't land there. As it was, all the cars were parked on both sides of the landing strip, which also held a campground. There was a fleet of golf carts and vans manned by volunteers for almost eighteen hours a day to shuttle us back and forth from the regatta area to the cars. The members of this club did a superb job in all aspects of the logistics.

The one thing that was missing was wind. Two very light races were sailed on Saturday. The Race Committee did a terrific job getting in two races, in very challenging conditions. The trick of the regatta was linking puffs, and sailing through transitions zones of a south and north breeze that fought it out in the middle of the course. Former World Champion Larry MacDonald, who won the Canadian Open just a few days ago, won this regatta sailing with his young son Adam and Mike Healy. All the results for the Blue fleet, the White fleet and Red fleet can be found on the ILCA website.

Why the Lightning

When the founding members of Fleet #1 commissioned Olin to draw them a simple small lake day racer, they could not possibly have envisioned the success the Class would continue to enjoy seventy years on. Much has been said by many people over the years about the boat, and it is perhaps best summed up by 1992 America's Cup winner starting helmsman and former Lightning World Champion Dave Dellenbaugh this way:

The Top 10 Things I Like About The Lightning:

- 1. There's Lightning racing almost everywhere.
- 2. Some of the best sailors in the world sail the Lightning.
- Lightning's are available from more than one highquality builder.

- 4. Lightnings even 20 years old are still competitive.
- 5. The boat is one of the best crew trainers on the water today.
- 6. The Class is not so strict as to discourage experimentation which makes the boat faster and easier to sail.
- 7. The Lightning has interested the finest sailmakers in the world, so the sails and the tuning guides look great and are easy to use.
- 8. The Lightning is a very roomy boat for daysailing.
- 9. Lightning sailors sail hard, but they're not too cutthroat—someone's always ready to answer questions.
- 10. The Class management is as good as you'll find in one-design sailing.

Historical Leadership

No class can survive, let alone prosper, for seventy years without a wide variety of leaders throughout the years. Unlike builder owned and directed classes, the Lightning Class, like the Star and Snipe and other enduring classes, is truly an association of people who are interested in the fundamental principles of fun and fair play. The Class not only survived, but thrived through technology changes of wood to fiberglass hulls and wood to aluminum rigs.

I was asked a few weeks ago to try and find out how the Class was able to transition from wood to glass hulls. As fate would have it, I spent the entire weekend of the 70th with former International Champion (what the North American's were called prior to the advent of the World Championships) Carl Eichenlaub, riding around on the little aluminum tug that he built a few years ago, which is now owned by Lake Erie District Commodore Bill Neal.

Carl's version of what led to the change from wood to glass hulls goes like this: there was a guy, Carl could not remember his name, or more likely, was being too kind to reveal it, who just went and built a glass hulled boat, without permission from the class. This owner just sailed the boat, the class be damned. Carl recalled that there was a meeting which involved the builders that included him and Bob Seidelmann (and no doubt, others), and it was Seidelmann who told the builder of this glass boat "you are going to force us into this business." Cool heads prevailed, and rather than stick to old technology, the Class leadership ended up embracing glass construction as one of the first classes to do so, and the rest is history. The best part was the transition did not immediately obsolete wooden hulls, the evidence for which was the fact that Stu Anderson sailed #8503 well into the glass boat generation, winning frequently. Of course, the legend was that if the termites had ever stopped holding hands, "Glockenspiel" would have fallen apart on the spot.

Rock Stars

Once a Lightning sailor, always a Lightning sailor. While the foundation of the Class are the multitude of local fleets, the class remains a force internationally because of the people who are attracted to it, and because of its status as a Pan American Games class. A short list of some of the household names in the sport who sailed in the Class with varying success include: Lowell North, Ted Turner, Dennis Conner, Ken Read, Dave Dellenbaugh, Dave Curtis, Neal Fowler, Steve Benjamin, Andy Horton, Colin Beashell, Glenn Darden.

The Strongest Point of the Class – Apprentice/Mentors = Fast Friends

Anyone who has followed some of what I have written about the state of the sport over the years knows I am not a huge fan of the Opti Class. Yes, it does have its strong points for some kids, but it isn't the only solution for most sailors. The key difference between a junior sailing an Opti and one sailing in a Lightning is that in an Opti that sailor might have a coach talking to them after a race about what they could have done differently, whereas in a Lightning, you can have a mentor right there helping that sailor learn immediately.

This sort of Apprentice/Mentor system is also evident through the "Lightning Labs." It's a simple concept, well executed. A group of talented sailors get together and run a clinic for those who want to learn more about the boat. This sort of thing has always been done on an ad hoc basis in the Class, but it has been formalized with great success. On the 4th of July this year, A "Super Lightning Lab" was run before the 70th, with the likes of Larry MacDonald (with his kids Adam and Joy), Greg Fisher, Randy Shore, Brian Hayes, John Faus, Bill Fastiggi, Class President Steve Davis, Steve Ray, Craig Thayer, Tom Allen on a wide variety of topics.

The Lightning Class has historically been a multi generational class. This was clearly evident during the 70th with parents sailing with their kids, and some boats having three generations aboard. In fact, Fisk

Hayden, sailed hull #2 with his son Steve (a North American Champion) and grandson Jeffrey, which is the FIFTH generation of Lightning sailors in the Hayden family.

Learn Local, Grow Global

The Lightning Lab concept works everywhere, even in Africa. Here's what Skip Dieball has to say about his experience in Nigeria.

"In the spring of 2007, ILCA President Steve Davis and I embarked on a trip to Nigeria to work with the Lightning Fleet there. We truly didn't know what to expect and the trip couldn't have been any better. The local fleet took great care of us and we learned a lot about a truly different part of the world!

From a pure sailing perspective, they sail in a very challenging venue, Lagos Harbor. The shipping channel goes right through the middle of their racing area which provides plenty of excitement, but add to that decent thermal breezes and a significant current and there's never a dull moment.

We spent a great deal of our time running a "Lightning Lab." The term is used mainly here in the USA as a traveling series of clinics that are fleet sponsored and bring in notable sailors to share their wisdom. Steve and I worked with the fleet for three afternoons in an effort to get them geared up for their Nationals Championship. Attendance at the lab increased everyday! We covered a lot in a short period of time and had a good time with it.

For the Nigerian National Championship, which both Steve and I sailed, we raced one day inside the Lagos Harbor and one day outside in the Atlantic Ocean. The event was a true test as the challenging "inland" sailing was in contrast to the speed sailing in the ocean.

The Lagos Yacht Club is a nice paradise in an otherwise strong urban setting. The chaos of everyday life is magnified in Lagos by the extreme number of people that don't have the "everyday" conveniences we have in the USA. Public transportation...far too many small taxis. Public services...good luck. It is clear that the spirit of the native Nigerian people is strong. They have many obstacles, unfortunately largely out of their control.

Steve and I had a great visit. We often talk about going back and visiting the many friends we made...someday!"

Boat Grant

To augment the Lightning Lab program, in order to attract new blood from the ranks of the post college crowd the class has started a very successful boat grant program. While a modest start, it has grown significant very quickly. It's a pretty simple concept grants are given to sailors who demonstrate a commitment to race the boat. By all measures, this program is the basis for long-term future growth.

History Repeats Itself

The apprentice/mentor aspect of the sport has been evident within the Class for decades, almost everywhere the boat exists. My admitted bias is based on my experience as a young sailor at the Buffalo Canoe Club, which has endured as one of the foundations of the Class for decades, having hosted many major Lightning regattas, and personalities that have contributed directly to the class, and often times, decades later, through lessons they have imparted to others.

It is impossible to name every club and person in the Class who has played a large role in the Class, if not sport, and while it is not intended to slight those not named here, there are some people who simply need to be acknowledged for what they did decades ago that pay dividends today.

Probably the best place to start is Karl Smither. He was a great sailor (won one Internationals, and was second many times), but an even better gentleman. Karl was a leader of leaders. He always ran an eminently fair protest hearing, and people around the Great Lakes (if not the entire country) learned much about sportsmanship from him. I've often been told by a key international juror and umpire that Karl provided him with a good deal of the basis for his ability to properly chair a Jury. So, forty years on, lessons Karl Smither taught to a young sailor from Michigan are paying dividends in the form of fair jury decision on a global basis.





Of course, Karl and his wife Idy had a daughter named Anne, who married a guy named Tom—Allen. Son Bob Smither was a Class stalwart for decades, and active in USYRU/US Sailing too. Who can forget his "Hot Yachts in Cold Water" article in the mid-70s? For those reading this who are not familiar with the Allens, Tom Allen has probably won more major Lightning regattas than anyone else in the Class, ever. Tom and Anne won Pan Am medals, with Dr. Larry Bone. Tom had several near misses in various Olympic boats like the FD, Tempest, and Finn. It is impossible to think of Lightnings and not mention the success of the Allens. Tom is also a Past Commodore of the BCC, and Anne is a Past President of the Class and is the current Commodore of the BCC. Karl Smither was a Past Commodore at the BCC too. And no doubt Karl and Idy smile down from above on those accomplishments, but they are probably most proud of the fact that Tom and Anne's son, Tom Jr., won the first George Fisher Sportsmanship Award.



The Next Champions

In the early 1970s, New Jersey sailor Jim Carson provided the leadership for the creation of the Lightning Junior North Americans. A few years later, Royal Hamilton YC sailor, Larry MacDonald, Sr. led the way to the creation of the Junior Lightning Worlds. The list of winners of these regattas have been duplicated through all the major continental class championships as time passes.

Jim Carson has had too many great crews to count, many of whom went on to be great skippers in their own right. Perhaps one of the families he influenced the most are the Lutz brothers, Jay and Jody. Jay first burst on the scene in about 1974 at the Cleveland YC, where he started a streak through the class that has never really ended. Both Jay and Jody sailed with their kids in the 70th.

In a few weeks, the Junior Lightning Worlds will be held in Montreal. Another generation of MacDonalds will be sailing in this event—Larry, Jr.'s daughter Joy.


Notes from participants at the

There was beautiful summer weather in Skaneateles Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, although the winds were light on all three days, so light that only two shortened races were run on Saturday (the first one a three-hour drifter) and none on Sunday. Skies were sunny, and the high temperature each day reached the high 70s, with nighttime lows in the low 60s.

The host Skaneateles Country Club provided superb support and great meals on all three days. Boats were assigned bow numbers in advance; boat-on-trailer parking spots were lined out in advance in chalk, identified by bow number. After skippers and crew set up their boats, they moved their cars to an auxiliary lot, with constant shuttle service available between the lot and the boat trailer parking. A team of six ATV tractors with trailer hitches and a crew of 15 volunteers dispatching and driving worked with the nine crane operators to quickly move boats on trailers from parking place to the water, needing only about an hour to splash the approximately 130 boats that sailed. It was a very smoothly-run operation.

On the water on Saturday there was a promise of a light northerly breeze, and with a 10:30 first start for the blue (national-level competitors) fleet, there was the potential for three races on the windward-leeward course. However, the first successful Blue Fleet start didn't get off until 11:30, and the White Feet (club racers) finally got off at 11:45, with the Red Fleet (classic boats) around noon. By then the wind had turned light and variable, with a giant hole around the windward mark, and by 1:00 PM, boats from all three fleets were congregated around the line from the windward mark to the extended offset, with some Red Fleet boats ahead of some Blue Fleet boats. Finally, a light breeze sprang up, chutes were hoisted, and by 2:00 PM most boats had crossed the downwind finish line on a shortened course at the leeward mark.

Then it was time for the lunch break, during which a nice 6–8 mph breeze sprang up. But, by the time the second race had started at 3:00 PM for the White Fleet, the breeze had died again. It took until 4:30 to round the windward mark and reach the extended offset, immediately beyond which was the upwind finish mark. That was it for racing for the day; boats headed in and were all secured back on their trailers by 6:30 PM, in time for a very well attended dinner and ceremony. A very full day, even in (or because of) the absence of significant wind.

On Sunday the 10:30 scheduled start was postponed, and by 11:00 the racing was abandoned, leaving us the rest of the morning to get back to the docks and get our boats back on trailers to pack for the trip home. The closing and awards ceremony started at 12:30, and those who were traveling home that day were on their way by 2:30 PM.

The water in Skaneateles Lake is so clear, and so cold, that a tempting swim turned into a most refreshing pick-up for those who ventured in. Team Blue Two jumped in after packing their boat, and felt really refreshed for their 2:30 PM departure. Heavy traffic on I-81 South coupled with single-lane choke points at mile markers 206 and 190 turned the planned seven-hour trip home into a ten-hour marathon, but we were still very happy that we had been there.

Lightnings Invade Skaneateles

On Thursday, July 3, through Sunday, 137 boats participated in the 70th annual Lightning Reunion Regatta.

Planning an event of this size is an enormous undertaking, especially for the few fleet members of Fleet 1. The regatta has been in the making since the week after the 60th, with many of the same committee members carrying over. These included Dave Penfield, Joan and Bent Thompson, Mickey Barnes plus a few others from around Central New York. Following the flood that characterized the 60th, the Skaneateles Country Club (SCC) studied their weak spots and set out to correct them. With 500 vehicles, 700–1000 people and ~ 150 boats involved, the logistics of where to park, how to house and feed people, and boat logistics are daunting. With two cranes, a sheltered harbor, a double wide launch ramp, plenty of flat ground lakeside, and their own airport for camping, the SCC is one of the few clubs who can accommodate such an event and keep it informal and affordable. They did an amazing job. We offer them a huge thank you.

People traveled from far and wide. Kimmo Aromaa from Finland traveled the farthest. Beth Richards, from Plano, Texas, drove the farthest, followed closely by Fisk Hayden with hull #2 from Florida.

A special and unique feature of the event was that the annual woody roundup was held at the same time. Needless to say, Sunday was another beautiful day for a suntan on the water. Jeff Linton turned to more productive activities—fishing. After the obligatory water fights, the race was to the hoist, then food and festivities.

So "Not" the Doldrums

The site of full sails and even a spinnaker or two flying while looking out over the lake as we were being towed to the launch area raised our spirits with the expectation that the second day of the 70th Anniversary Lightning Event. We would experience a decent wind following the light air of the first day of racing. Once launched, we quickly made ready and paddled out to the dock where we raised sails and sailed off into a lake filled with

100 plus Lightnings, from our old Woody to the latest high tech racing machines, only to find that it appeared that the amount of boats out on the water must be sucking up whatever wind we had believed existed.

As we drifted off into the middle of the lake, boats were stretched into the distance, a clear sign that the more aggressive racers had already started to head to what they expected would be the start line.

As skipper I allowed our boat to have its way, letting whatever wind the other boats weren't sucking up fill our ancient sails as much as possible, as we peacefully drifted along. After a while my wife looked up and noticed someone had just jumped out of their boat. Before long there were a few more people doing the same. As more and more crew abandoned ship it became they started to swim from boat to boat to talk similarly to what we had been doing. Then small groups started to meet in the water, giving the impression of crews who didn't actually have a boat.

As we started our long paddle back to the dock, we noticed a few of those who had jumped out of their boats had decided not to return and were actually swimming to shore while towing their boats. One particular boat had all three crewmen, each holding a line attached to the bow, swimming out in front of her.

As we moved up in position on the haul-out line, I could still see that the lake was filled with Lightnings. The sailing portion of the event was coming to its close. Sidebar-Regatta Planning

Looking at the changes since 1998, we should note the logistical changes made by Fleet 1 and the SCC. Many of these ideas can be carried over to our other regattas.

- 1. The SCC team located the tent to higher ground and used a poleless tent frame.
- 2. They put hard tags on all trailers and assigned parking spots for the boats using tags on lines that would not wash away.
- 3. They arranged for a pack of 4x4 four-wheelers and farm tractors to move the boats and made full use of the launch ramps. The tag numbers allowed the right trailer to show up at the right hoist at the right time. This got 137 boats into and out of the water in about an hour. It was remarkable!
- 4. They made lakeside camping much more usable.
- 5. They realized this was a big party and kept things on schedule.
- 6. They made the parking shuttles to the airport and camping easy at all hours.

I think we all recognized the tough decisions the RC had to make. Suggestions for the RC at any large event could include using guns, large and high flags, shapes for light air and radios. Radios do more to keep the big fleet racing on schedule than anything I can think of. I have had one for years, but seldom use it.

1938 was not a great year, measured in most ways. Nine years after the Wall Street Crash of 1929 the United States was still stuck in the Depression. Six years of the New Deal had changed the country, but unemployment was still high, wages low, and America's middle and working classes were struggling. In Europe, Hitler was expanding his power. Chamberlain tried to appease Hitler in Munich (we know the rest of that story).

So it seems an unlikely time for Olin Stephens to design, and the Skaneateles Boat Company to build, the first boat of what would become one of the most successful sailing classes ever. While it is true the huge growth in the Class numbers happened after World War II, we can take heart that the birth of our Class did not come with the post war boom, but in the depths of pre-war, depression America.

Why did the Lightning make sense in tough economic times, and does that bode well for the Class in 2009?

The Lightning was designed to be affordable. While the price tag for a Skaneateles boat was still out of reach of most Americans, it was a boat that could be built by amateurs. There were countless "Father and Son" boats built. It was small enough to be pulled behind a normal American car but big enough to fit the entire family for a day sail. We all know that one design, properly enforced, means affordable racing. It eliminated the ability of the rich to buy superior boats and dominate the Class.

A BOAT FOR ALL ECONOMIC SEASONS

These same attributes, plus our strong Class Association and large pool of competitive used boats, bode well for the Class during this economic downturn. Our boat and our Class are well positioned to be the Class that makes it. Potential buyers who thought about that larger boat should be presented the "Lightning Option." The man or woman who might like to have a racing keel boat, but can no longer afford the tow vehicle, needs one of us to present our Class as a great option as well.

In economics, products like the Lightning are called "inferior goods." That is a terrible term for our beloved boat, but all it means is the kind of good for which demand goes up when the economy goes down. The classic example taught in economics class is "hamburger vs. steak." In good times, demand for hamburger goes down and steak goes up, making steak a "superior" good. The opposite happens in bad times. Demand for hamburger goes up. Well, we sail the hamburger boat!

As I am writing this, the price of gasoline at my local pump has just fallen to \$1.58. That is down by over half from last year. The combination of bad economics and cheap gas works for us. It makes Lightning racing an inexpensive alternative to that European trip or other competing forms of recreation. We are experiencing the perfect storm for the growth of our class.

So what do we do? Let's take advantage of this opportunity. Let's present our boat as the winner in the Recession of 2009. Tell our friends to forsake those "Herbert Hoover Yachts" and join us in our class. You know what will happen. Even when the economy recovers it will be too late. They, like us, will have fallen in love with our boxy boat. They will be hooked.

CAMP SEA GULL MOLDS LIGHTNING SKIPPERS

I can still remember the day vividly, even twenty-six years later. It was a typical hot and humid July afternoon along the lower Neuse River, a fivemile wide stretch of open brackish water, not far from Oriental, North Carolina. A solid 15-knot, south-westerly sea-breeze had pushed in, as it did most afternoons, creating ideal conditions to test the sailing skills of young men who had spent three weeks training for the opportunity to achieve the most coveted sailing rank at Camp Sea Gull, the "Lightning Skipper." Out of 760 campers each session, ten would might earn the rank.

One of the Sailing Master's assistants had confidently hopped on board to give the hands-on sailing test and promptly told me to back down away from the dock for 100

feet, keeping the Lightning in irons. "Jib up, board down, I called out to my crew," and thus began the most nerve-wracking thirty minutes I had experienced in my fourteen years.

The assistants, also known as UAs, as in "Un-Assigned", had the responsibility for running the sailing program under the leadership of the Sailing Master. The UAs usually spent their evenings along the waterfront in the spacious sail loft, keeping the fleet of fifty Sunfish, ten Lasers, ten Lightnings and a mix of "big boats" operational. That meant fiber-glassing the numerous holes that were created during that day's Sunfish regatta, patching up sails on the old sewing machine, or making assignments for the fifty sailing staff members for the next day. Little did I know, I would later be lucky enough to serve two summers as a sailing counselor and three more in one of the sought-after UA positions, maintaining the Lightning fleet —the fleet that had been the centerpiece of Sea Gull's sailing program since its founding in 1948.

> Wyatt Taylor, who had been named General Secretary of the Raleigh YMCA in 1936, had a unique vision and convinced the Board of Directors that a camp located near

> > coastal waters would provide excellent camping and seamanship opportunities. When the camp first opened in 1948 on 300 acres along the shores of the Neuse, Cherry Point Marine Air Station, directly across the river, donated ten wooden Lightnings, beginning Sea Gull's rich history with the Class. Over the years, the camp has maintained a fleet of Lightnings of varying builds and vintages, including Mobjacks, Clarks, Lippincotts, and most recently, Allens. Wyatt's

founding ideal was never to compromise with mediocrity. He could often be heard down on the docks saying, "Things don't just happen, you make them happen!"

And so it was, late that afternoon that a somewhat cocky, scrawny fourteen-year-old was trying to make the rank of Lightning Skipper happen. After backing down and falling off onto starboard tack, the UA asked me to demonstrate all the points of sail with proper sail and centerboard trim, set a spinnaker and gibe several times, douse the chute, approach a mooring buoy, and properly complete a man-overboard procedure. In between these drills, I was guizzed on things ranging from Bernoulli's principal and lift, to how to land on a lee shore, the purpose of all the knots, anchoring techniques, mast rake and bend, and all the nomenclature of the Lightning. Then, all of a sudden, in an act that we trainees had always heard was more myth than reality, the UA proceeded to up-ship the rudder and jump overboard. (You gotta be kidding me!) I now had to execute another man-overboard, only this time while sailing without a rudder, controlling the boat with only the main and jib sheets and our weight.

In order to complete the Lightning Skipper practical, there was one last test, which was also the most daunting. You had to pull off a perfect docking under the watchful eye of the Sailing Master standing on the main tower of the pier. Stop the boat too far from the dock and your crew may not be able to heave the painter far enough, but smack the boat into the dock and, well...total embarrassment! Fortunately, I managed to cut the boat into the wind at the right distance, using the chine to slow the momentum, and the boat drifted up to within four feet of the pier. "Jib-down, board up!" As I waited nervously on the dock to find out if I passed, Pete "Quack, Quack" Morasca walked slowly towards me.

Pete has been a fixture at Camp for over thirty years as the Sailing Master and recently the Director of the Sea Program. He is known for molding the sailing program into the nationally



recognized program that it is, for mentoring hundreds, perhaps thousands, of campers and counselors on sailing and seamanship, and for promoting the Lightning as the training platform of choice for Sea Gull.

Pete is one of many lifelong sailing buddies made at Sea Gull, and I'm fortunate to still keep in touch with the same guys I raced Lightnings against in the Camper Championships and Counselor Match-Racing regattas. We sailed Lightnings together as campers, became staff trainees and counselors on the sailing staff, and eventually UAs as Assistants to Pete. One of these guys, Henry DeHart, is now the Director of Sea Gull, while others of us are active in the Lightning Class. We still get together almost every year to take a sailing trip, and we frequently reunite back at Camp to show our kids where we first started sailing Lightnings. And after ten years in the Class, it is because of Sea Gull's Lightning program that I will finally realize one of my sailing goals this September in Burlington, Vermont—competing in the Lightning World Championship.

There are surely too many former Sea Gull campers and counselors that have been active in the Class over the years to name them all, but several that come to mind include Peter Rich (my long-time crew), Jay Taylor (NC), Philip Taylor (NC), James Taylor (NC), Bob Astrove (DC), Steve Cushman (Chicago), Dan Morton (NC), Corky Gray, Mark Hillman, Steve Gregg, Dov Estroff, and Mike Greene.

And like so many adults who remember the first time they rode a bike without training wheels, or skied down a slope on their own, I can remember Pete and the UAs lifting me up over their shoulders that summer afternoon and heaving me off the dock into the Neuse River— after passing my Lightning Skipper. It was the same dock from which my father and I would go for our first sail together on a Lightning five years later during parents' weekend. My father took the helm of a Lightning for the first time since building hull #4270 as a teenager forty years earlier. Things don't just happen, you make them happen.




Coming Home...A Wandering Sailor Finds His Way to Buffalo and Much More!

Neal Fowler (15202) sails with Fleet 329 in Annapolis, Maryland; he has been sailing for more than thirty-five years. After sailing in many high performance and highly competitive classes, he is once again sailing Lightnings. Here is his story.

As a junior sailor on Long Island Sound in the early 1970s, the Lightning was the official junior boat. There were hundreds of them. During July and August, there were four major events held on weekdays that drew enough Lightnings to require splitting the Fleet into separate divisions. I had come up through the Blue Jay Class (aka little teeny Lightning), and by crewing for various adult Lightning sailors on weekends, had gained the use of their boats for some of the junior events. The junior activity during the week encouraged big turnouts, and we enjoyed some limited success and many failures on the racecourse. It was all great fun, but the chance to learn from some of the best small boat sailors in the country on the weekends was my good fortune. The adult competition (Bill Shore, Lou Pocharski, Jeff Penfield, Bob Seidelman, and many others) was very good, and the opportunity to race against them on the weekends certainly made a huge contribution to my sailboat racing education. How can you beat that? The Lightning Class remains much the same today.





During and after my college days, the Fireball, 470 and finally the 505 classes (the 505 is still my favorite) occupied virtually all of my sailing time. I did not sail a Lightning again until I did some crewing during a five-year stretch as a sail maker in the early 1980s. I had the opportunity to crew for Jim Crane, (still fast on the reaches), and the late great Bruce Goldsmith (I'm still laughing). These guys introduced me to the Southern Circuit, one of the most enjoyable series of sailing events ever conceived.

Life got in the way after the early 80s, and my sailing was limited to occasionally filling in as pinch helmsman for various teams who could not make it to Savannah for the Southern Circuit. This role I was more than happy to fill. I had the pleasure of sailing with Lightning Hall of Fame crews Hale Walcoff, and Kip Hamblet at a couple of Savannah events. Again, strong turnouts well run events and solid competition kept me coming back.

I kept racing 505s (east coast events only) in the summer and IC dinghies in the winter, all on a very casual basis. About five years ago my long-time 505 partner retired to keel boat land, and my kids figured out that I wasn't cool enough to be around. This freed up my time to do more events. I took the opportunity to go to the NAs at the Buffalo Canoe Club (BCC) with old college teammate Dave Peck and his wife Nina. I learned that not only is the Buffalo Canoe Club not in Buffalo— it is not even in the same country as Buffalo! Again the Lightning volunteers managed a well-organized, well-attended, very competitive event.

Even though the BCC was not in Buffalo or the USA, I did manage to bond with the BCC bar, which led to a reunion with an old 505 buddy, Todd Johnson. We have since sailed four Southern Circuits, two NAs, one Pan Am Trials, a couple of Districts, and some other stuff together. Life got in the way again this past year, but I know I will end up back in the Lightning again. Why?

ORGANIZATION—The vast majority of the events that I have participated in have been well run, very organized and, most importantly, I did not have to set them up. I have drifted away from several classes that I love to race, as I realized that almost every event within a two-hour drive from home was to some extent organized by me. Every hour of racing required four to five hours of organization, and that did not include getting the boat ready (which often didn't happen). With folks facing limits on their free time, a strong class organization like the Lightning allows sailors to concentrate on sailing.

COMPETITION—The sailors in the Lightning are very competitive. I know, I've tried just about everything. They know the boats inside out and have been very willing to share their expertise. Rarely does an on the water dispute remain unresolved on the racecourse. At a recent Midwinter championship, we counted 15–20 boats that we believed were capable of winning any given race. That's depth and pleasant racing.

EASE OF GETTING UP TO SPEED—The somewhat keelboat-like sailing characteristics of the Lightning (I think of the Lightning as half dinghy half keelboat) remove the emphasis on the expert boat handling that is required to compete in the high performance classes. You can develop competent boat handling in a fraction of the time. Hence, more new sailors, more old guys (yours truly), etc. have a shot at winning.

PEOPLE—The people sailing the Lightning are fun. The boat does not require giant or miniature sailors. Regular guys are the right size. Women and kids are the right size, and every-one can be competitive. The events are geared to provide entertainment to the whole crowd.

HISTORY—So many of the legendary one-design sailors in North America have ties to the Lightning. It's humbling to compete for the same trophies they did (and still do!).

GREAT EVENTS—Southern Circuit, North Americans, Worlds, Pan Am status, Pymatuning (well I've heard it's fabulous).

COST—The Lightning is a tremendous value. You get a lot for the money. A strong organization, an evolved competitive product out of the box, a ton of events, and strong resale value give sailors more than most other classes. And for those who want to sail with family members (you know, that free time limitation), the Lightning is the way to go.

I think the Lightning package is one of the best values in sailing. I know I will keep coming back, even though most of the hiking straps are in sideways and the Buffalo thing still has me scratching my head.

The ILCA Boat Grant program has been one of the highlights of the Class for the last few years, and when I was asked to write a short piece for the yearbook, I was excited to do it. People know many things about the program, so I have decided to take a different approach with the article—one that would inform everyone about the inner workings of the program, how it started, some funny stories, some success, some failure. Hopefully this will give everyone an insight to the program that they have not thought of before and will have everyone even more energized to support, participate and encourage, what I believe, is an amazing program.

THE BEGINNING

Bill Fastiggi and I came up with the idea for the program in the winter/spring of 2006. We discussed the concept of getting younger, college aged sailors involved in the Class and how we could make that happen. We came up with the rough outline of a program and pitched it at the NAs in San Diego. The one point we stressed was that this was a marketing program, and advertising was the key. Nickels graciously agreed to provide a boat the first year, we were lucky to have a great boat donated, and the ILCA purchased a boat. We were also loaned another boat, so we were ready for year #1—four boats and all looked great.

THE FIRST WEEKEND

The first real weekend of the Boat Grant was at the No Gas Regatta in Annapolis. All four teams arrived, and we were optimistic. Well, lets say we had some serious growing pains that first week. We had a broken mast, a boat with a hole, a boat that needed some rigging work and some bruised egos. John Faus and I were there that weekend, and I remember the discussion Monday morning. It went something like this..."What did we get ourselves into?"..."I don't know?"..."Is this going to work?"..." I don't know, I think"...This is when the program took its biggest turn. Bill, John and I got together and had a meeting with the mentors, after which we pressed on. It was smooth sailing from there.

RESULTS

The program has had considerable success so far, including District Championships, winning the President's Cup at the NAs, along with numerous local events. It has also provided the Class with excellent exposure to the sailing world. One of the things I'm convinced it has done is bring the Class together for a common cause. It has energized everyone of us to help support our youth and keep them coming into our Class and sailing the boats we all love. The success of uniting our Class in this goal alone has been worth it.

Last year Colin Kirby was the first grantee to purchase his boat and stay in the Class. He has joined fleet 50 in Washington, DC. This is the trend that we are hoping to see and the beginning of what we anticipate will be the real fruits of our work.

The Boat Grant Program continues to be a great success and one that everyone in the ILCA should be proud of. I urge everyone out there to get that boat in your fleet that is not being used into the hands of a junior sailor. Support Junior Sailing in the Lightning. If you are interested in the program, we always need help and hope that everyone continues to support the program!

NICK FARINA — MENTOR: STEVE DAVIS

When one thinks of Colorado, snowsports, hiking, climbing and other mountainous activities come to mind—but not sailboat racing. Since moving to Colorado three years ago, I have sailed borrowed boats, due to the kindness of Steve and Jan Davis, and more recently, thanks to the Lightning Boat Grant Program. This program allowed me not just to compete in regattas, such as the ACCs and NAs, but also to introduce some of my crew to the Lightning class. I have been teaching several young women to sail over the last few years in weekly fleet racing. Both my fiance, Elizabeth Henry-Hooker, and fellow graduate student, Jenii Bernet, made the transition from beer-can mountain sailing in Colorado to big regattas on the ocean.

When submitting my application to the Boat Grant Program, I planned to have both a travel team of experienced young Colorado sailors and a local team of young women who have been sailing with me for the last few years. To my surprise, both Jenii and Elizabeth were eager to travel across the country and race.

Two days before the ACCs, Jenii and I left Boulder, heading to Rock Hall with three goals: 1) arrive safely, 2) teach Jenii how to trailer a boat, and 3) pick up our third, Ian McKenzie, in Baltimore. All were accomplished sans issue, and I prepared to drive a boat for two days instead of a car. We had our moments of brilliance, spending half of a race in third, only to pick the wrong side and drop back to the mid-teens. The rest of the regatta was practice—for me to get used to sailing with more then five boats, and for Jenii, how to do bow in pressure situations.

For the NAs, Elizabeth and my old skipper, Bretton Gardner, sailed with me. We had moments of brilliance, allowing us to qualify in the green fleet, but they were overshadowed by moments of hilarity. The last race of the qualifying series sums up the week. After a dreadful start, Elizabeth came up on the rail for a puff, and suddenly, all I can see are her feet pointing at the sky and Bretton trying to grab her. Luckily, the spinnaker halyard had wrapped around her foot and we were able to pull her in easily. However, this had pulled the halyard out of the mast so we had to drop the jib, switch halyards, race, drop, and switch again. Later

After these, we joked that it was Bretton's turn next. That almost happened on the last day after a tack when more then half of his body was over the side. That definitely didn't help, but we also didn't manage the top third of our upwind beats very well and ended up getting bounced around in the middle too much, which lost us a lot of boats. We had a 10th on the first day, but with the rest of our races in the high 20s or low 30s, we ended up in the yellow fleet. In the end, we sailed a consistent series in the yellow fleet and ended up third.

It was a great summer and a once in a lifetime experience. Tyler, Steve, and I all loved the Lightning, so if anyone needs crew next year, contact one of us.

JUSTIN COPLAN — MENTOR: ROBERT SENGSTACKEN

This was one of my busiest summers ever, thanks to the Lightning Class. It is still hard to believe that it all came together so smoothly. Throughout the season I sailed in eight Lightning regattas and competed in the Nyack Spring and Summer series. By the end, both my crew and myself came away much better sailors than we were at the start of the season.

At the start of the season we were a very rough sailing team. We found out at the first couple of regattas that our performance in a competitive field was very hit or miss. We first had one of those hit days at the Cedar Point Early Bird regatta where we had the boat very well tuned for the conditions and sailed two firsts. Of course, the previous day had been a miss day, landing us in fourth overall. If there was something that we had to do over the season, it was to nail down where that 'go fast' comes from in the Lightning and put together consistent regattas.

From then on we focused on increasing our consistency. This came down to changing our strategy to be more conservative. We worked toward getting into a good position and from there always trying to minimize losses. This basically came down to having my crew being on the lookout for when I was trying to do something stupid. We played the odds and made sure we beat most of the fleet, rather than looking to come out on the very top of each race. We found that usually our biggest loses and worst finishes came from when we tried to make big gains. Instead, we relied on our solid boat speed to make small gains on surrounding boats and let that add up over time. Of course, this doesn't work all the time, but it was a solid groundwork. It was at the Metropolitan Districts where our conservative approach really paid off.

In the shifty winds of the Navesink we came out on top of a competitive ten-boat fleet to win our districts. It was a great relief to know that we had qualified for the North Americans. From there the next regatta was the 70th Anniversary. This was a great time had by all. It was also a great opportunity for me and my team to meet more people in the Lightning Class, all of who were extremely encouraging and a great help in teaching us more about the boat.

Next up was the Atlantic Coast Championships down in Rock Hall, Maryland. We were very excited about this event because it would be the most competitive regatta yet, excluding the 70th. The conditions turned out to be a big surprise for us, and we weren't ready for the

strong winds that were served up. Throughout the whole prior season we had been generally been sailing in lighter breeze and we had no solid experience in de-powering in the stronger breeze. After the first day we got knocked around a lot on the upwinds and found ourselves no longer sailing smart. Once again the Lightning Class showed its colors, and the lab on Saturday night was very helpful. We learned how to better de-power the boat and were back up on our feet. The second day brought lighter wind we were better aquatinted with, and we posted a twelve and an eight.

Newport was one heck of a time. This was hands down the most competitive group of sailors I have ever sailed against. The qualifying series was a bit of a disappointment when we never found a groove to keep us competitive in the top of the fleet. We continued to struggle to get the boat going fast downwind. When all was said and done, we ended up in the green fleet. We would end up sailing much smarter in the green fleet than we had during the qualifying series, posting a worst race of an eleventh and coming out second. This was a wonderful way to end our season.

I would also like to thank everyone who made this summer possible. Specifically, I would like to thank the members of the Boat Grant Committee, Tommy Allen for donating a boat, and Todd Wake for donating a set of North sails in top condition. I also need to thank our home fleet, Fleet 75, for being so supportive of me, especially Bob Sengstacken and Joan and Gary Hurban. I would like to thank my team Fiona Gordon and Ellie Turk for being such great team players and sticking with it through the whole season. I know they both had a great time this summer, and we are all looking to get back on a Lightning as soon as we can.



Taking the baton from club mentor Jim Carson, Mitch Hnatt organized a series of Wednesday night sessions that sought to teach the fundamentals of Lightning faculty, including Jody Lutz, Jarrett Lynn, Jim Carson and Dave Ruiter, Class participation was strong in numbers and enthusiasm. In general, the age of most sailors was 14–15, so while it may take a few years to get them immersed in Lightning sailing, the seeds have been planted. The winner of the Club Junior Championship (a product of the class) was Rob Alldian. Rob has also showed as a promising first rate crew.

One junior seed which blossomed in 2008 was Matty Schon. A graduate of Jim's Junior Lightning Program, Matty reached national prominence with a 3rd in the World Youth Championship held in June in Montreal. The winds came from the perfect direction, planets were perfectly aligned. I don't really know, but I found myself in the right place and at the perfect moment to be able to finally fulfill this dream—a Lightning fleet in my hometown. If you are interested on how to do this, here's is the recipe for getting a new fleet.





The ingredients you need are: four good friends, lots of water, a touch of wind, sunshine, lots of beer (other harder drinks also work fine), and one Lightning. First start by talking to your friends about the good times you have when you are sailing a Lightning. Depending on your friends interests, talk about how good it sails or maybe how wild the parties at the regattas are. Remember, there's something in the Lightning for everyone. When you get their attention, keep bringing it up, whenever you get the chance. After the stories have set, mix the friends with the Lightning, the water, the wind and the sunshine. This might be regarded as a dumb con job, but it was for a good cause, and I don't know how, but soon enough I had four friends looking for boats.

In order to finish the recipe, a strong and supportive Class is a must. To be able to get the boats lots of lightning sailors helped out finding them and getting them shipped. People like John Faus, Todd Wake, Jim Carson, Tom Allen, JP del Solar, Steve Davis, and Ryan Flack to name a few, all kicked in to stir up this awesome recipe.

Well, I must say we are looking forward to tasting this recipe. The table is set and the most southern Lightning Fleet in the world is ready to sail!!

We are working towards building up the local fleet and have attracted five racing members who sail regularly in our weekend races: Bob and Sterling Bush, Dan Hertzer, Keith Kraner, Dave Spira and Christian Whately. We are hoping to add a couple more this summer, namely Bill Bogardus and Dave Johnson. We are close to reaching a critical mass so that active local racing may continue while other sailors hit the regatta road.

(June 20–21 & July 18–19) The Districts are the qualifier for the North American Championship hosted by Sodus Bay Yacht Club on Lake Erie this August. We anticipate that three or four boats will represent Niantic at this North American Championship.

Cedar Point Yacht Club has been home to Lightning Fleet 126 for over forty years. CPYC hosted the Lightning North American Championships in 2003 and Atlantic Coast Championship in 2007. Fleet 126 races every Saturday from Memorial Day to Labor Day. On the major holiday weekends (Memorial Day, Fourth of July and Labor Day), we sail three-day regattas, culminating with club barbecues and a competitive Commodore's Cup Series. We also host two invitational regattas. The Early Bird Regatta takes place the weekend before Memorial Day and is hosted together with the Flying Scot Fleet. The Fall Classic takes place the last weekend in September and is run in conjunction with the Thistle Fontelieu Regatta. The parties at these regattas are becoming legendary, so if there's any way you can attend, you'll be happy you came.

Gianni Cuccio, Josh Goldman, Dick Thackabery, Ched Proctor and Eric Heller all qualified for NAs. At NAs a few weeks later, Ched took 11th, Gianni took 20th in the Championship Fleet, and Josh took 22nd in the President's Fleet.

The 2008 Club racing was a steady season for Fleet 126. 2007 was a season of stellar growth for us, increasing boats on the course and qualifiers. So, we had a hard act to follow this year. 2008 Season—Celebrating 65 Years of Lightning Racing on the Potomac During the Lightning 70th Anniversary Year!

Fleet 50, in its 65th year, started the New Year with a goal of continuing the tradition of racing excellence on the Potomac and in the Dixie District, and to be one of the largest fleets in attendance at the Lightning 70th Anniversary Regatta at Skaneateles, New York in July. How did we do? Read on...

Season Highlights

Nineteen Fleet 50 skippers and ninety-seven crew members sailed a total of 173 boat-race days on the Potomac in 2008. Twelve skippers qualified for the 2008 Championship series that included fifty-four races spread over sixteen Sunday race days, plus the Potomac Cup and the PRSA Spring and President's Cup regattas. Fleet 50 organized and ran the Potomac Cup Regatta and provided seventy-five PRSA race committee person-days, including eleven Primary Race Officer days during the season—for a total of 674 person-hours of service to PRSA. Additionally, David Thompson served as Regatta Chair for the PRSA Spring Regatta and Nabeel Alsalam was the PRO for the Spring Regatta Upper Course. Fourteen Fleet 50 boats participated in twelve out-of-town regattas, including the WJM and North American Championships Regattas, and one Fleet 50 boats sailed the 2008 Southern Circuit. Ten Fleet 50 boats sailed in the Lightning 70th Anniversary regatta, the second-largest contingent attending.

Awards

At the Annual awards banquet on February 7, 2009, we offered congratulations to Russ Roberts and Team Windchaser who took first place in the Fleet 50 Championship Series! The Fleet Championship series runners-up were Nabeel Alsalam, 2nd; Frank Galagher 3rd; Rick Welch 4th; and Jeff Storck 5th. Nabeel Alsalam won the Bloody Rudder, awarded for doing the best among Fleet 50 skippers in out-of-town regattas, and the Iron Skipper award for sailing the most days on the water as a skipper. Skipper-nominated crew awards went to Becky Mach and Michael Scott for Best New Crew; Stefano de Leo and Alan Rukin for Most Improved Crew; and to Brian Kuzon, Rebecca Thomasson, and Piercarlo Brunino for High-Impact crew. The Crew-nominated Skipper awards went to David Thompson for Mr. Hospitality/Congeniality; Red Fehrle and Collin Kirby for Team Spirit Skipper; John Pemberton for the Bungle Bucket and Collin Kirby for Skipper of the Year. Catherine Calvin was awarded the All-Weather Sailor Award for the most Fleet 50 crew days on the water.

Our signature event each year is the Doc Gilbert Memorial Potomac Cup Regatta at Leesylvania State Park. This year the Regatta saw two of the nicest back-to-back sailing days in recent memory, weather-wise, with sunny skies, temperatures in the 70s, and good brisk winds. We couldn't ask for better conditions! Allan Terhune, sailing with spouse Katie and Fleet 50 skipper Todd Johnson, scored an unprecedented five bullets to take first place. Jon Guth and Dick Hallagan tied for second; Steve Constants took 4th, and Jason Werner 5th. Frank Gallagher was the highest-placing Fleet 50 skipper, in 7th place. Eleven other Fleet 50 boats competed in the regatta.

PRSA Spring and Fall Series and Regattas

The PRSA spring season of eight Sundays kicked off on April 13, later than usual, and the Sunday weather patterns treated us to five nice days, one no-race day (thunderstorms) and a couple of days with interesting weather conditions. One of those was Spring Series # 6 on May 18 when the river flow was way up due to heavy rains in the preceding week, and winds of 16–19 MPH were forecasted. In actuality, the winds never got above sixteen, and while the cold rain that fell could have been discouraging, it was never a distraction for skippers and crew dressed for it. PRO Pat McGee set up a long windward-leeward course in front of the Power Plant, with the windward mark in front of the Robbins-Gioia office building in Old Town and the leeward mark well north of the green channel mark north of the Naval Research Lab. This did put some of the racecourse in the navigable channel, where we had to dodge the Spirit, the Dandy, a big barge and other large boats (one boat got a bit too close to the Spirit, which objected by sounding five angry blasts of a horn). However, we had great downwind legs with chutes up. For the final windward leg of the third race, RC decided to move the windward mark farther south, placing it in front of the Chart House restaurant, but the anchor didn't hold and the current carried the mark almost to the Wilson Bridge. That could have made for a really fun long downwind finish leg, but unfortunately, after the last boat rounded, the wind died, not to pick up again until after the race was abandoned, and we had accepted tows home. Russ Roberts finished the spring series in first place, but followed closely by Frank Gallagher, Nabeel Alsalam, Rick Welch and Pat McGee.

Nine Fleet 50 boats participated in the PRSA Spring Regatta on Memorial Day weekend. On that weekend we had good winds on Saturday, and PRO Nabeel Alsalam got off three races run before it was time to come in. However, there was not enough wind to race on Sunday.

Our summer went by quickly, and before we knew it, the fall season had started, with the 64th annual PRSA President's Cup Regatta, run concurrently with the 14th annual Leukemia Cup regatta, on the weekend of September 6/7. All week we knew that troublesome weather could be coming for the weekend, and it did—on Saturday the river was closed to boating by the Harbor Patrol due to the passage of the remnants of Tropical Storm Hanna. 

Winds were forecasted to be from the ENE at 8–9 MPH, but they were better than that, and RC got off four races, one on a triangular course and three on a windward-leeward course, before it was time to come in. What a great way to end the season! Nabeel Alsalam took first place in the Fall Series, with Russ Roberts, Rick Welch, Jeff Storck and Frank Gallagher rounding out the list of the top five finishers.

Lightning 70th Anniversary Regatta July 4th Weekend

The high point of the season for ten Fleet 50 skippers and 23 crew members was the 70th Anniversary Regatta hosted by the Skaneateles Country Club on a sunny and pleasant July 4th weekend. Kudos to the members of the Skaneateles Country Club who orchestrated the entire event and welcomed all who participated.

This was an extraordinarily well-run, historically significant event, with a total of 129 boats on the water, including the ten Fleet 50 boats. Bob Astrove and Doug Dixon sailed their woodies in the Red (classic Lighting) Fleet; where Bob took first place and Doug won the People's Choice award for his restoration of hull number 584. Skippers Butler, Dillard; Keith, Kirby, Storck, and Thompson sailed in the White (club racers) Fleet, and Chandler Owen and Nabeel Alsalam sailed in the Blue (regional/national competitors) Fleet.

Winds were light on Saturday and non-existent on Sunday, but the social activities and the opportunity to meet so many dedicated Lightning enthusiasts far outweighed the slow pace of racing on Saturday. The water of Lake Skaneateles was so clear and so refreshing that it tempted many skippers and crew to dive in during lulls in the racing or for a quick dip before hitting the road on Sunday.

Other Out of Town Regattas

John Pemberton took his boat and crew to Savannah for the first leg of the Southern Circuit in March; Nabeel and Russ hit the No Gas Regatta in May. The 2008 Dixie District Championships were held on the Chesapeake, hosted by Fleet 329, the weekend of June 14 and 15. Four Fleet 50 boats participated, and all four (Alsalam, Gallagher; Pemberton; and Thompson) qualified for the North Americans to be conducted in August.

Also, several Fleet 50 skippers enjoyed summer Wednesday Night sailing on the Potomac, and also contributed as coaches to the Virginia Special Olympics program. Additionally, Nabeel and Bobby and their crews hit the Atlantic Coast Championships at Rock Hall on the Eastern Shore in July. Subsequently in October, Nabeel and Collin hit the Frigid Digit at Annapolis, with Collin getting a taste of a capsize in the Chesapeake, and David Thompson represented Fleet 50 at the Pennsylvania Governors Cup at Susquehanna. In November David covered the Hampton Fall Fling. This was a most active out-of-town series for our fleet.

District Commodore: Juha Aromaa

The Finland District sailing season 2008 was like the winds in Finland this year. Rising.

Our former commodore Sakari Pesola had started a project to get six new boats from US to Finland. After many discussions between Juha Aromaa and Hugh Armbruster, Nickels made an offer of new Lightnings if we were able to get four buyers. Thanks to enthusiasm shown, work done, and the favorable currency rate of dollar, six boats were packed in a container and shipped to Finland. New boats were absolutely needed; the only disappointment was that the boats arrived a bit too late for the European Championship in Switzerland. If we ever put together another order, the project should be started before Christmas.



After unpacking the containers, six teams from Finland traveled to Neuchatel, Switzerland, to participate the Europeans. In the practice race it was so windy that we had swimming practice, and the floating capacity of the charter boat was tested. No essential physical or mental damages were experienced that effected the actual races. The highest finishing Finnish team was led by Kimmo Aromaa, with Juha Aromaa and Mika Aromaa from Helsinki as crew—they were 4th. The youngest skipper was Risto Pesola (age 11); he finished his first European Championship 14th out of sixteen boats. Well done.

The Finnish Championships were arranged in Lohja, a lake that is famous for shifty winds. The weather was cold, wind from the north, and the breezes were quite strong. One boat lost its rudder, three boats capsized—some of them even twice.

Lightnings came to Finland 60 years ago. The 60th Anniversary Regatta was held in Merenkävijät Helsinki, where the Lightning story started. In the evening there was a gala dinner where the seniors recalled the good old days, and a photo show reminded us of the fun we have all had with the Lightning Class. The funniest thing we saw was the changes that have been made in transporting the boats (see the ILCA 2006 Yearbook for a horse drawn sled pulling a boat to the snowy waters edge). Participating in the races, and being part of the Lightning family makes it all worth it.



Suomen Districtin kausi 2008 oli kuten tuuletkin tänä vuonna. Kiihtyvä. Edellinen kommodorimme Sakari Pesola oli aloittanut projektin kuuden uuden veneen saamiseksi USAsta Suomeen. Juha Aromaan ja Hugh Armbrusterin keskustelujen jälkeen Nickels teki tarjouksen uusista veneistä, jos vain saisimme kasaan neljä ostajaa. Kiitos innostuksen, tehdyn työn ja taalan suosiollisen kurssin lopulta kuusi venettä pakattiin konttiin ja lähetettiin Suomeen. Uuden veneet tulivat ehdottomasti tarpeeseen, ainoa pettymys oli, että ne saapuivat maahan vähän liian myöhään ehtiäkseen Sveitsin EM:iin. Jos toinen projekti saadaan aikaiseksi, se pitäisi käynnistää jo ennen joulua.

Kontin purkamisen jälkeen kuusi venekuntaa matkasi EM:iin Sveitsin Neuchateliin. Jo harjoituskisassa oli niin tuulista, että sekä uintitaidot että vuokraveneen kelluntaominaisuudet tulivat testattua. Ei oleellisia fyysisiä tai psyykkisiä vahinkoja ja kisaan. Lopputuloksissa paras suomalaisjoukkue oli Kimmo, Mika ja Juha Aromaa Helsingistä (4.) Nuorin kippari Risto Pesola (11 v) aloitti Lightning EM-uransa sijalta 14 (16 osallistujasta). Hieno saavutus.





SM:t järjestettiin Lohjanjärvellä, joka on kuuluisa vaihtelevista tuulistaan. Sää oli kylmä, tuuli pohjoisesta ja puuskat varsin kovia. Yhdestä veneestä meni peräsin, kolme venettä ui ja paras niistä kahdesti.

Lightningit rantautuivat Suomeen 60 vuotta sitten. 60-vuotisjuhlaregatta pidettiin Merenkävijöillä Helsingissä, josta koko Lightningin tarina sai alkunsa. Illalla järjestettiin juhlaillallinen, jossa vanhat parrat muistelivat vanhoja hyviä päiviä ja kuvakavalkadi vahvisti, kuinka hauskaa touhu on oikeasti ollut. Täytyy myötää, ettei mikään näytä niin hupaisalta kuin vanha muoti, lukuun ottamatta ehkä veneiden kuljetukseen kehiteltyjä luovia ratkaisuja. Mutta kisoihin osallistuminen ja litiperheeseen kuuluminen ovat olleet sen arvoisia ja ovat yhä.


A Finnish Anniversary Regatta was arranged in August to celebrate 60 years of Lightning sailing in Finland. The regatta

The 2008 sailing season was much better than in average for our Fleet.



"It's been a very busy year for the Lagos Yacht Club. We have about 65 monohulls (40 Lightnings, 15 GP14s, 12 Ospreys) in the Club and 60 catamaran Hobie-16s. On any given weekend we are able to get about fifty of those boats on the water. Additionally, our sailors are made up of thirty-two different nationalities—makes for interesting comments both on and off the water.

We competitively race almost every weekend, with about one-half of those races being sponsored events by local businesses (many with international parents) that provide giveaways, wine, beer, drinks, food, and prizes. Like 2007, it was musical chairs vying for Top Honors in the Southeastern Lightning District with nine different winners for nine regattas.

Josh Putnam won the Springboard Open at Western Carolina with three points in four races. Josh, a graduate of Citadel, was not an unfamiliar face, as he began sailing as a junior with one of Bob Harkrider's boats with other junior crew. Henry McCray and Marcus Moehlman finished 2nd and 3rd respectively with six and seven points each. Sailing began after a rain delay with 5–15 conditions. Sunday brought on a little more breeze from 12–25 knots with low 50-degree temperatures. After one race, everyone headed in due to the combination of wind chill, water temperature and unstable puffs. A Flying Scott demasted and turtled in a huge puff. The crew was rescued and then later the boat was recovered.

Our 2008 District Championships was held once again at Columbia Sailing Club, which is at the center of our District. The Club had just completed its beautiful new clubhouse which featured a very large fireplace. Lightning members refinished an old wooden Lightning with a side cut-out for bar tender entry. It would no longer give pleasure through sailing but would do so as a center for libations après sailing. Greg Griffin from Florida joined us at our SE Championship and won the regatta of eighteen boats hands down with seven points in three races. A rain storm forced us ashore after the first race, and racing resumed after a short delay. Unfortunately, the winds, or lack of, did not cooperate on Sunday, which led to no races. The District Championship was awarded to Richard Waldkirch, the first SE District member with fifteen points who edged out Terry Tyner in a tie-breaker. Pierce Barden followed with sixteen points in 4th. Our District meeting was held and Columbia was awarded the District Championships again for 2009. 2008 began on a good note for Fleet 488, as a team of young sailors was awarded one of the Lightning Boat Grants. Skippered by Nick Farina, the team, including Elizabeth Henry-Hooker, Jenii Bernet, and Ian McKenzie, consisted of both new Lightning sailors and experienced juniors. After sailing in many weeknight series and local regattas, they traveled to the East Coast to first sail at Rock Hall, Maryland, in the ACCs and then to Newport, Rhode Island, for the North Americans. The competition was great at each had the constructive criticism and atmosphere needed for learning. With all the comments in mind, the team returned to Colorado to finish the season with a win in the Lightning Class at the Colorado Governor's Cup, including three bullets and narrowly missing the overall trophy.

From early April through the end of October, the Lightning Feet sailed in three series run by the Denver Sailing Association. While Colorado has few mosquitoes or raining days, making an evening sail especially enjoyable, the wind kept us alert. It ranged from 0–30+ on any given night and shifting 360°. Colorado had three representatives in Newport, with David Spira, Bill Darling, and George Darling, as well as the Boat Grant team joining Bill, Raeyane and Jenii. We all enjoyed the tough competition, good camaraderie, and great sailing in the world renowned venue.

Our Fleet grew this year with both new boats and new sailors. Al Gawthrop and crew started sailing early in the year and rapidly improved weekly, learning the hard way about sailing in heavy wind and how to right a Lightning. After crewing throughout the summer, Jerry Shustrin purchased a new Nickels, while Lucas Armstrong and crew decided to switch to a Lightning from a C15.

We look forward to a great 2009 season, especially with the prospect of two new boats out on the water.

Youth World Championship

This year's Lightning Junior World Championship was nothing short of a thrill ride. From start to finish, it was one of the most exciting, stressful, frustrating, and yet still unbelievably fun regattas of my life—all rolled into one.

The regatta started out with a bang—20–30 knots on the practice day! This was indeed the first time I have ever seen a Race Committee actually abandon the practice race. The breeze hit so suddenly, and so dramatically, that one boat capsized completely, snapping their mast in half! With one boat's mast down, we returned to the dock and spent the rest of the afternoon taking a mast from a spare boat and using it to replace the broken one.

Day 1 of racing saw similar conditions, with puffs upwards of 20 knots. When we went in for lunch to change sails to a different boat (Junior Lightning Worlds Class Rules require each team use a different boat every race), the competitors were informed that we would not be sailing another race. The St. Lawrence had claimed yet another two boats in collisions, and having already broken into the reserve boats the day before, finding even more boats proved to be quite a hassle. Luke, Bernie, and I were lucky enough to have won the first race, putting us on top of the standings through the first day of racing.

Day 2 was a bit lighter, with strong currents headed the same direction as the wind. After a bit of a pile-up at the pin, we managed to salvage a 4th place finish in the first race of the day and a 2nd in the following race. After the second race, storms proceeded to threaten our racing area, again kicking up the winds and causing abandonment of races for the day. Although the Race Committee hoped to finish all racing on Day 3, the "wind god" had a different idea for us. With very light winds only allowing a single race, we finished the day with a 2nd that put Ian

Schillebeeckx in first, Bernie, Luke and I in a close second, and Matty Schon, Timmy Crann, and Jason Lutz in third.

The final day of racing brought light, northerly breeze that was VERY shifty. Thrown into the mix was a ripping left-toright current that made for some crazy course angles.

The first race of the day, Matty rounded the windward mark after a 20-degree right shift, along with current, allowed him to brilliantly lay the mark. We, having overstood by nearly fifty boat lengths, rounded in a workable second place position. With consistent current, but unpredictable winds, I decided to split from Matty and continue on starboard gybe, heading up current first and then with the current into the leeward gates. Matty did a very impressive job holding his position through finding a great breezeline, with both of our boats extending a significant amount of distance on the rest of the fleet.

The final race found the top three boats separated by two points. After a crazy start, we managed to round the windward mark in first, with both Brazil boats close behind. At the leeward marks, Bernie and Luke noticed large storm clouds over the left side of the upwind. We decided that they were close enough to force a left shift on the upcoming beat, and we split completely from the fleet, being the only boat to round the right marks and head left. Risky move, yes, but also correct, and soon enough, along with significant rain came a significant shift. And indeed—a left shift. The Race Committee shortened the course to only three beats, and Bernie, Luke and I managed to make it to the finish winning the race, successfully clinching the World Title. Ian finished second in the regatta, and Matty in a close third.

The regatta was run brilliantly, and I couldn't have been happier with the conditions and organizing effort. The Race Committee worked extremely hard to both keep us safe and provide for fair racing. Winning the World Championship was exciting, but the best part of it all was to have our names put on the same trophy that my uncle, Jody Lutz, won twenty-eight years ago.



The 2008 NAs were held in picturesque Newport. Sail Newport at Fort Adams was the main location where the boats were stored and the regatta was hosted. The NYYC was the sponsor club and did a great job both on and off the water. Katie and I teamed up with Jeff and Amy Linton for this regatta. While in Tampa over the winner I was talking to the newly crowned "Yachtsman of the Year" about the Lightning sailing plan for the year, and somehow our NAs team fell together. It was a little different going into such a big regatta not having sailed together, but we knew our experience would work it out. 105 boats attended with everyone upping their game for the chance to qualify to compete in the US Worlds in Burlington. It was by far the deepest, most competitive fleet I have seen since I started sailing Lightnings, and many shared this thought. The week was going to be a battle. We talked about being consistent and not having the bad one early (which we would find out not to be the case when we were duking it out with NAs and World Champions for 31st place in the first race).

The regatta started for us on Friday. Katie and I met Amy at the airport in Providence and headed to Newport to get the boat ready. Jeff was off sailing with Big Daddy Harkrider in Cape Cod at the Corsair Nationals. The ladies and I got the boat measured and tuned and were able to take on Newport for a nice dinner and to watch the "Opening Games." We were rather amused by the Chinese drummers. We caught up with Jeff after dinner and headed to our hosts, Katie and Will Welles. Katie and Will were kind enough to host our team as well as Tim and Heather Rowe from Vermont.

The First Day of Qualifying started off with a postponement. It seemed like every day started with a six o'clock wakeup and a postponement. The air was light, and the sail out to the ocean was time consuming. I don't remember too much of that day, other than the first race was in lighter air, and we were 6th or so and won the 2nd race in

the heavier breeze. Jeff steered the boat in and was trying hard to race the people in the harbor. I remember laughing watching him pump the main with one hand and trying to steer and not spill his beer with the other hand! Clearly he's had practice. As we rounded Fort Adams, we dodged hundreds of spectators for the Jazz Festival where Aretha Franklin was about to take the stage.

The second day of qualifying was sailed on the northern most course in an awesome sea breeze. Two races were sailed to wrap up the series. We had two good races to ensure that we qualified for the Blue Fleet and really felt ready for next few days of the championship. We knew we had speed, and we also felt like the team was coming together. The NYYC hosted a cocktail party that night. NYYC is spectacular. The sunset from the lawn was breath taking. That is where we found the lucky feather. Katie swore it was a sign and from the lucky swan she fed all week at the Nas in Cedar Point the year we won. Katie was not too hungry as she and Kristine had seven helpings from the nacho bar while Brian was speaking. We left the yacht club and decided to grab a quick bite at the local diner. We just happened to be at the same place as the Fishers, Moriartys, Wakes, Brian Hayes and Hofmeisters. Captain Hof was telling us about how he ordered his senior citizen meal and could not decide between the free coke and sundae. Very humorous to say the least. I thought Amy was going to pee her pants. Allan got a hold of some crayons, and by the time we left every team was drawn on a placemat with great detail.

Day 1 of the Championship Racing was tough, for us at least. The course was sailed just north of the Newport Bridge, due to the possibility of inclement weather. As we were preparing, we felt our speed was good, and we had a good plan



for the course we were about to sail. The race started, but I really did not. It started off tough for us and we never recovered...we finished 31st in the first race. We battled hard and sailed our best and still wound up with the result. This was by far the toughest fleet we had seen, and it was going to be a battle. As we crossed the line, all three of us looked at each other with silence. We worked our tails off, sailed the best we could and it did not work out. I figured I would break the ice, and I said "well, that sucked." We all kind of chuckled and Jeff said, "Well we learned two things. We cannot duck boats to get to a side, and we have to stay bow out." We said we were going to follow that plan the next race and see where it would take us. We started near the boat and started to work the right side. Early in the race it was tight, but we decided we were not going to take the transoms on the left to get over there. Jeff and Katie kept us working the shifts, and I just kept driving as fast I could. Three quarters of the way up, it could have gone either way, but in the end, sticking to our guns paid off, and we rounded fifth at the first mark. We worked hard and found our way to the lead and won the race. 31–1, not exactly what we hoped for, but we decided to keep our head down and keep working. We headed back to our hosts house that night for a nice dinner and to watch the Olympics...a good way to unwind.

Day 2 of the championship started with the races on time and we finished third in this race. We sailed well and were happy. We followed our same plan and let our speed and conservative tactics do the work for us. The second race of the day started, and we were doing OK, until the wind went crazy. The RC did a great job of cancelling the race, and as the weather continued to deteriorate, we headed back to Sail Newport. With only one race in on Day 2, we were in a bit of trouble, as we needed the RC to get three races in on Wednesday in order have a throw out. (There was a little disappointment as our stock was down and the down pour was the cherry on top.) We were 7th, but it was a tight group and we knew anything could happen. The RC pushed back the start time to 9:30 (which I was happy about), and we headed out for the evening. We were saying our prayers the weather man was wrong for the next day. The forecasted weather was no wind until the sea breeze would up at two. We went out to eat at "Flo's Clam Shack." Jeff, Amy, Katie and I ate more fried seafood than anyone should in one sitting. What a surprise we ran into more Lightning sailors (Frank Atkinson and the whole Vermont gang). We all felt a little sick after that, but what an amazing view of the ocean from Flo's. We spent the rest of the night at the Welle's house. For entertainment that night we watched Michael Phelps win his eighth medal and watched Katie chase Will's dog around trying to get her clothes back. The forecast was not great, but I was still hoping for the sea breeze we were all talking about...as we entered the ocean, it came. Now we had to do our part. We got all tuned up and we started to talk our plan. Jeff said the plan was simple-good starts, haul ass, get the mark and turn left! Seemed easy enough. The first two races we sailed hard and earned a 2, 5. With a drop we were leading, but we needed the last race. The last race started with fifteen minutes to go before the time limit. We knew there were a few boats in contention, so there would be no funny business before the start, so we kept our same plan. We had a good start near the boat end and worked right. We had a good lane and went fast. Half way up the beat we were looking good, real good. There was a little lefty at the end, and we rounded the weather mark fourth. We worked the run and got to the bottom second. The final

beat, there was more of a shift left and we were able to sail on port for a long time, which made defending a little easier. We rounded the final weather mark in third, knowing if we stayed the same we would win. The final run was LONG. Jeff, Katie and I kept pushing each other to work as hard as we could until we finished. Then we did it, the race was over, and we won. Katie let out a little whoop, and we had high fives and hugs all around. We had sailed a major come back to win the NAs. Phil Mickelson had broken through.

On the sail in, we did our usual routine. Jeff steered in, Katie flew the kite, and I became the wave blocker. The difference was we were pumped. Jeff had his last Busch on the way, and Katie had a huge grin. She could barely trim the kite because she could not stop clapping her hands. As we were being congratulated by the fleet and planing in the nice ocean waves I thought about what a great week we had. Jeff, Katie and I had a blast sailing together, and we had even more fun on shore with Amy. We took a team that had not sailed together before, and made it work out. Many folks were curious to see how Jeff and I would sail together, and I can say from my side, it was great. I hope to get to crew for him sometime...Amy greeted us at the dock, with a huge smile and drinks, and it was a happy afternoon.

The NYYC did a great job with the Banquet and running the regatta. The banquet was held on the lawn of NYYC, and it was truly special for us. Our team wants to thank Randy Shore and Wendy Lotz for all their hard work. Sail Newport and all their staff were very organized and hospitable, considering what a busy week they had. Ron Hopkins and the entire RC were great. I know they made the NYYC, Sail Newport and ILCA proud with the job they did under trying conditions for a good part of the week.

Lastly, I want to again thank my team. Katie does all the hard work so I can work and sail. She is the toughest person I know, and no one tries harder. She insists that if we are going slow it won't be because the boat is dirty. Jeff and Amy were great. Jeff is truly a team player, both on and off the water. He helped in every aspect of making this happen, including soaping the boat every day. The week could not have gone better, and even if we did not win, it would have been one of the more fun weeks of sailing. Jeff showed why he is always at the top. He works harder than anyone I have ever met, never quits and is always thinking. Don't let his laid back personality fool you, he is a fighter! Finally, I want to thank Will and Katie Welles for all their hospitality in Newport. They welcomed us into their home and were most accommodating. We can't wait to repay them in Annapolis and Tampa. We are all looking forward to Sodus Bay and Burlington. See you on the water!

THE PRESIDENT'S CUP

The last time I sailed in Newport it was 1991, and the North Americans were rudely interrupted by Hurricane Bob. Ryan was 8, Maegan was 6, Abby and I were seventeen years younger as well. Abby was only twenty-six, of course. Certainly, the memories from that year revolve almost exclusively around the hurricane itself.

This year's memories are very different. After arriving in the early morning hours on the first day of qualifying, fresh from a family wedding in Costa Rica, the three Ruhlman teams qualified in the President's series. Dave Werley, Nick Turney, Caroline Sundman, and Martha Fisher did a great job of delivering, measuring and setting up our boats. We sailed in a variety of conditions on every race area possible and finally had more than a hypothetical answer to that age old question, "would you rather be first in the President's Cup or last in the Blue Fleet?" More on that later.

A difficult first day of racing in the qualifiers was put quickly into the proper perspective when we learned that my uncle had passed away earlier that day. Tom, Shelby and Karl proved to be just too tough, especially downwind, and they ultimately won Race 1, Abby, Dave and I finished 2nd, just ahead of Maegan's team in 3rd and Ryan's team in 5th. As one might imagine, dinner conversation that evening revolved around how cool it would be to have a Ruhlman sweep, who was going to beat who, another beer, etc., another beer, etc., you know the drill. I'm not one of those guys who have a great memory for races. Unlike some guys I know who can remember every click of the mainsheet over their storied careers, my "hard drive" is several sectors short. Sail Newport is a difficult venue for hosting one hundred boats and three hundred competitors, and the folks did a nice job. Race management was very well handled over a variety of conditions and race areas. PRO Ron Hopkins and his team did a great job, particularly of communicating with the three fleets. I think we are all growing in our appreciation for the use of radios.

Okay, so what is our answer to the age old question, "would you rather be first in the President's Cup or last in the Championship Series?" First of all, I want to thank Abby and Dave for maintaining their competitive spirit in the face of early disappointment. That went a long way to our success this year. Having now actually done both, I have to say, honestly, that I can argue it either way. I suppose if I went into the event given the choice before Race 1, I'd pick first in the President's Cup, but that's not how this wonderful game works. It's great to win the President's Cup, and it is no easy feat, in any year. This year was no exception, and that is a tribute to the level of competition in this great Class.

THE GOVERNOR'S CUP

Alec and Alex and I were prepared to deal with adversity on this trip. The truck just got out of the shop, we filled it full of gear and gas, attached the boat and left Thunder Bay for our 26-hour drive to Newport. It was our expectation that we would be fixing vehicles, tires, and struggling with sleeping in a tent for the week. However, everything was going quite smoothly; we had no complications with travel, the tent seemed comfortable, measurement and registration went effortlessly. There was nothing left to do but clean and tune the boat, go for a sail and sit back in our lawn chairs relaxing with a beer. Laid back and relaxed, yes we were. We were ready for the qualifying races and some fun competition.

GOVERNOR'S CUP

Qualifying is the most difficult part of the North American Championships. The first day we went into the ocean and were second out to the race course. This was purely due to how early you can wake up when staying in a tent. We were able to spend some time figuring out the course. Race 1—ouch, poor start and went to the right a little and a solid 24th. Some thought went into the next race. After getting a clear start and clear lane, we managed a sixteenth, but it was quite close. The two-hour trip back home was less than exciting. I don't recall hearing any conversation on our boat for the whole trip. It seemed that we had lost some of our excitement.

A change was necessary, so we went back to our tents and did a little refocusing with our good friend "Sailor Jerry" and his buddy "Coke." After all, tomorrow was a new day and, remember, we are prepared for adversity. This was just a new challenge, two top ten finishes was our goal to ensure a Blue Fleet spot. The team was ready. Good starts, clear air and great speed all combined together in one great day for our boat. We had it figured out that the third qualifying race was a 7th and the 4th qualifying race was a second place. There was a difference on the boat ride back to Sail Newport today. We were talking, we were exited we were ready for tomorrow. I even was considering new shorts for tomorrow.

Then it hit us. Steve Constants told us that the Race Committee had scored us DNS and DNS in race 3 and 4. My immediate response was "Well, we will just have to go and get that fixed right now." The only possible way to have that happen would be if we sailed in the wrong color fleet on those races. That clearly was not possible, as we had a discussion on the way out to the race course about how it would suck to sail in the wrong qualifying heats. This discussion would have prompted us to look at the sheet wouldn't it? No, we didn't need to look, we knew what color fleets we had to sail. Apparently, we just did not know the order of those colors. Next year I have requested that our boat just have only one color ribbon to fly off the backstay for all qualifying races. This would be the only fair solution I can think of for us. After qualifying in 85th place it was now time to rethink and deal with our next challenge. We knew that with twenty-eight boats, winning the yellow fleet would be no easy task, and the racing would be close.

Now for the racing. We soon realized who our competition was going to be on the course. Good thing the first start was a general recall because I "generally recall" watching the fleet sail away after the start. The first race finished with us in the lead. Marcus Moehlman worked his way to second throughout the race. Frank Hanson was third but had the lead often in Race 1.

In the next race the battle was mainly between Juan Santos Jr. and Marcus Moehlman for first and second. A late gybe paid off for Juan Santos Jr. for first, and Marcus Moehlman was second. We were third by what must have only been an inch to Brian Gibbs. So we leave the first day in a tie for first with Marcus Moehlman and crew. Our take on the first day was that Bob Bush always seemed to get off the start line and into clear air very quickly, Marcus Moehlman was always going to be near the front, and Juan Santos Jr. showed moments of brilliance.

There was only one race on Day 2, and it finished with dying winds and a big shift. Marcus was in the lead with us just behind. A gybe set allowed us to get to the new shift and more pressure. At the finish it was us, then Clinton Hayes followed by Marcus Moehlman. We were hoping for wind on the last day, and we were able to get some. With only a two-point lead on Marcus, we set a goal to get ahead, stay ahead and keep an eye on bow 29 at all times. We had a decent start, but I could not believe the start that Pierce Barden had. Pierce had a solid lead as he crossed the fleet on port; he also had some great boat speed. He led all the way around the fifth race as well, but we were able to move past on the last leg. In the wind other boats were now going fast. Brian Gibbs, Bill Cabrall, Juan Santos Jr., and Clinton Hayes all posted good results on Day 3. Overall, the racing was as expected-close, challenging and fun.







LESSONS LEARNED AT THE 2008 LIGHTNING WOMEN'S NORTH AMERICANS

The 2008 Lightning Women's North Americans was my first event at the helm of a Lightning, and I sincerely hope it will not be the last! I had so much fun sailing in this event, and I took away several lessons learned.

My first lesson was that the Lightning is a great racing boat; it is tweaky like an Etchells but responds like a dinghy, and it was an absolute blast to sail downwind in breeze. But I think that was due in large part to my veteran spinnaker trimmer's flawless technique!

Secondly, the "B" course, 'North of the Bridge,' provided at times what could only be described as mysterious currents. While it was critical to always have a handle on what the tide was doing and it certainly helps to pay close attention to the visible current lines on the water, there were still a few areas on the race course where the current kept us guessing!

But let me back up a bit. Before the racing even started, I had already learned a lot about the Lightning Class. I watched in the months preceding the event how Randy Shore and the other event volunteers made their preparations with a dedicated and determined effort. I knew this was going to be an event to remember—but I had no idea that I would be a participant!

In fact, I wasn't certain that I would be a participant until the day before the racing started when I had a 4:00 AM wake-up call from Randy who said, "We're driving to Connecticut to pick-up your boat!" Groggily, but with interest, I jumped in the car where I learned that Randy's friend, Dave Spira, had generously agreed to let us borrow his boat for the event. Randy and I had discussed my interest in the event for some time, but without Dave's help, it would not have happened! So, we brought it back to Newport, got measured and registered, and proceeded to confirm the crew.

What I learned about my crew was simply that they were the best!

In the front of the boat I had Jen Flack, who I met the morning of the first race, and I could think of no better introduction than watching her handle the front of the boat like a pro! She was so smooth in her movements and knowledgeable about how to make the boat go fast. Well frankly, you'd easily think she built them (for those of you who may not know, Jen's family builds Lightnings at Nickels Boat Works in Flint, Michigan). Jen's mother, Nancy, filled the position of team mom, in addition to helping Randy as an event volunteer, and her efforts are greatly appreciated! As for Jen, well, she taught me a lot about the Lightning. It was a pleasure to sail with her, and I hope to do it again soon!

In the middle of the boat I had someone that can only be described as a class legend. In helping pull a team together for me, Randy Shore worked very hard, and probably the hardest part was convincing his extremely talented mother, Bonnie Shore, to jump back into a Lightning for the first time in many years with an unproven newbie in my Lightning debut. I'm not sure how he managed it, but I couldn't be more appreciative because it was truly an honor to sail with Bonnie. Rarely have I seen a spinnaker trimmed with such finesse. Bonnie kept both the sheet and the guy in her hands at all times, working them together for optimum rotation, and with flawless gybes she certainly made my driving look better than it was! What I didn't know was that this was not to be Bonnie's first win at the Women's NAs; in fact, she had previously skippered her own boat to victory in 1978 (OK, the year before I was born)—a fact that I was glad to have learned after the event, as it was already very intimidating to have a class legend in the boat with me. I will never forget how special it was and how honored I felt to have had this opportunity to sail with Bonnie.

Another lesson learned is that the competition in the Lightning fleet is very intense. The racing was extremely close; in fact, it was nip and tuck right to the end of the final race. Winning an event always provides a wonderful memory, but more importantly, what I will have taken away from my first Lightning event is the knowledge that the Lightning Class is about families, friends, & fun!

I am so fortunate to have had the opportunity to compete in the 2008 Lightning Women's North Americans, but it would absolutely never have happened without the overwhelming support of friends and families in the Lightning Class.

The racing in Newport provided exciting, diverse, and challenging conditions. And when the event had concluded, I learned that without a doubt, this is a class that I look forward to competing in for years to come!

MASTERS' NORTH AMERICAN CHAMPIONSHIP



I was looking forward with much anticipation to competing in the 2008 Master North American Championship in Newport, Rhode Island. I had spent several weeks in Newport over the last year and a half assisting and coaching one of the United States' paralympic Sonar sailing teams. Newport is a great sailing venue, and there is a lot to do when not sailing. Plus, I had a lot of sailing information if we sailed north of the bridge!

In addition, I was going to be reunited with Diego and Tito Gonzales. The last time we sailed together we won the Etchells World Championship. For the last two years Diego and Tio had been pursuing, full time, their goal of going to the Olympics. While they fell a little short, what a great experience to compete at the highest level as father and son representing their country. Sounds like a Lightning thing!

It was going to be fun to sail against and becoming reacquainted with many Lightning legends. There also was sadness, as several of the greatest legends would not be there. George Fisher, Bruce Goldsmith and Colin Park had given all of us some great competitive moments and had given so much to our Class and to sailing in general.

On the way to Newport, I traveled to Rock Hall, Maryland, for the ACC. It was a great place to sail, the organizing group put on a great show, and I got to sail with a next generation sailor, Charlie Proctor.

Charlie Proctor, Chuck, as his friends call him, is more than a chip off the old block. I look forward to sailing with him again. We need to pass a rule that both the Gonzales and Proctors cannot sail with each other except with me. It puts the rest of us at a competitive advantage.

The racing was very competitive. Jim Crane and his team won the first three races, with us in second. We were ahead in all of these races, but some less than perfect tactical decisions and great sailing by Jim put us in second. In the fourth race sailed we established an early lead and managed to stretch our margin as the raced progressed, with Crane's team second. It was a five-leg race, with winds 12 to 18 knots. On the last weather leg we slowed down, positioned ourselves and tack and tack on Jim and were lucky enough to stay in first and put a boat (Dick Hallagan) between us. We were feeling good going into the last day.

When we arrived at the venue the next morning, we discovered that were not counting the last race because the Race Committee only had scores for the first six boats. We had our work cut out for us, as there would be only two races allowed on the last day.

Our strategy was to have a good start to weather of Jim and tack on him at every opportunity. We were able to do this, and we won the race with Jim coming in fifth, thanks to Dick Moyer, Georges Peter and Bill Hoffmeister. We were in the lead by one point, but it really came down to who beat whom in the last race.

Team Crane decided to match race us starting about six minutes before the start. It became very exciting. At about three minutes with Jim slightly to leeward and behind (both on starboard), we jibed on to port and Jim bore off and stayed on starboard. We almost hit and he said protest. There was no need to go to the room, to have someone else decide if he gave us room and opportunity. We did our circles. As we did them Jim's boat circled with us. Having completed the required two tacks and two jibes, we kept circling for some time with Jim doing the same. With about 70 seconds we stopped circling at a point that positioned us overlapped and to leeward, about three boat lengths from the line. We managed our speed to stay overlapped and forced Jim closer to the wind as other boats set up around us. We saw that boats to leeward were setting up close and there was a large hole to weather. If we did not have a great start we risked being shot out the back, with Jim being able to tack on us. At about 40 seconds we back winded our main, got behind Jim, tacked on to port, moved up the line about two boat lengths, tacked on to starboard, trimmed in and had a great start, ahead and to windward. From then on, it was stay on top of Team Crane.

We had a great time. Thanks to all who put their time and effort into making it all happen. I know everyone understands those who participated in organizing stood up and came through when the Class needed you.

South American Championship

São Paulo Yacht Club hosted the 2008 South American Championship from September 10–14 on the Guarapiranga Lake. After four days of boat and sail measurement, the opening regatta was won by George Rider after the first two boats that crossed the line, Cesar Hirsh and Cristobal Peres were confirmed OCS. George went on to win two out of three races on the opening day and all three races of the second day. With Pedro Soares and Sidney Bloch, his boat seemed to always have that extra bit of speed and race course knowledge that were key to his victory.

Mario Buckup won the other two races but ended fourth, behind Tommy Sumner from Brazil and Juan Santos from Equador. These two teams batlled all the way to the final race, ending up with equal points in the Championship. Juan Santos was racing with Mario Buckup's boat. Mario as Brazilian champion had the use of the Olympic Committee boat.

All of the boats available in Brazil were offered to the visitors at no charge, following a month of negotiations between the countries participating. The new boat, manufactured in Brazil by Craftec, was presented to the Lightning Class participants and to visitors at the event, receiving praise from all and generating interest by several new and ex-Lightning sailors.

This new boat is part of the project to supply competitive boats to many countries in the 2011 Lightning Worlds to be held in Buzios-Rio de Janeiro.






